## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

- 4 FOR the purpose of establishing the Commission to Study Single-Member
- 5 Legislative Districting for the General Assembly; providing for the membership
- of the Commission; requiring the Commission to study the feasibility and
- 7 desirability of establishing single-member legislative districts for the General
- 8 Assembly and to submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the
- 9 Governor and to the General Assembly by a certain date; and generally relating
- 10 to the establishment of a Commission to Study Single-Member Legislative
- 11 Districting for the General Assembly.
- 12 WHEREAS, Evidence suggests that citizens increasingly are becoming
- 13 alienated from their government; and
- 14 WHEREAS, It is in government's interest to connect more closely with its
- 15 citizens and to engage citizens in the critical issues facing our State and nation; and
- WHEREAS, A citizenry that has the opportunity to interact more directly with
- 17 its elected representatives likely will help foster a climate of cooperative engagement
- 18 that allows government to address in a more effective manner the critical issues
- 19 facing society; and
- WHEREAS, Oftentimes the sheer geographical size of legislative districts
- 21 precludes direct interaction between citizens and their elected representatives; and
- 22 WHEREAS, The Constitution of Maryland currently provides that each State
- 23 legislative district contain one senator and three delegates, and that the delegate
- 24 districts may be subdivided into three single-member districts or one single-member
- 25 district and one two-member district; and
- 26 WHEREAS, Currently in Maryland, in 34 of the 47 State legislative districts the
- 27 three members of the House of Delegates of those districts are elected at-large; in 10
- 28 legislative districts, the House members are elected from a combination of
- 29 single-member districts and two-member districts; and in only three of those
- 30 legislative districts are the House members subdivided into three single-member
- 31 districts; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Some 38 states currently have only single-member state legislative 2 districts; and
- 3 WHEREAS, The year 2000 census is near and, subsequent to the census, the
- 4 General Assembly must redistrict the State legislature for the year 2002 elections;
- 5 now, therefore, be it
- 6 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That there shall
- 7 be a Commission to Study Single-Member Legislative Districting for the General
- 8 Assembly to assess the feasibility and desirability of proposing that the voters of the
- 9 State consider a Constitutional amendment instituting a system of single-member
- 10 legislative districts for the General Assembly; and be it further
- RESOLVED, That the Commission be composed of the following 11 members:
- 12 (1) Three members of the House of Delegates of Maryland, appointed by
- 13 the Speaker of the House, with one of the appointees being a member of the minority
- 14 party designated by the Minority Leader;
- 15 (2) Three members of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the
- 16 President, with one of the appointees being a member of the minority party
- 17 designated by the Minority Leader;
- 18 (3) Five members appointed by the Governor, reflecting a broad
- 19 spectrum of individuals from government, the academic community, public interest
- 20 groups, and the general public from throughout the State who possess interest and
- 21 knowledge about civic issues; and be it further
- 22 RESOLVED, That the members of the Commission serve without compensation,
- 23 but may be reimbursed for expenses in accordance with the Standard State Travel
- 24 Regulations; and be it further
- 25 RESOLVED, That the Commission report its findings and recommendations to
- 26 the Governor and, in accordance with § 2-1246 of the State Government Article, to
- 27 the General Assembly by December 1, 1999; and be it further
- 28 RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be forwarded by the Department of
- 29 Legislative Services to the Honorable Parris N. Glendening, Governor of Maryland;
- 30 the Honorable Thomas V. Mike Miller, Jr., President of the Senate of Maryland; and
- 31 the Honorable Casper R. Taylor, Jr., Speaker of the House of Delegates.
