SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A Senate Joint Resolution concerning

2 The Black Slavery Holocaust Memorial

- 3 FOR the purpose of expressing the support of the General Assembly for the efforts of
- 4 Black Slavery Holocaust Memorial, Inc. to raise funds for the purchase of land
- 5 on which to erect a memorial commemorating the 14 million black slaves who
- 6 lost their lives as a result of the extended slavery holocaust in America, and to
- 7 educate people about the horrors of slavery and the effects of that legacy on the
- 8 social, economic, and political conditions in the United States.
- 9 WHEREAS, Over 14 million black slaves lost their lives in the more than 200
- 10 years during which the legacy of slavery scarred this Nation; and
- WHEREAS, The unfathomable pain and suffering of a noble people, stolen from
- 12 their homeland, to live an ignoble existence in an alien and hostile country must
- 13 never be forgotten; and
- WHEREAS, The lasting scars from this legacy of slavery continue to manifest
- 15 themselves in the social, economic, and political conditions of this country; and
- 16 WHEREAS, Black History Month offered all Americans an opportunity to reflect
- 17 upon the rich cultural traditions of African Americans, as well as to remember the
- 18 grave injustices which have been dealt to this proud people; and
- 19 WHEREAS, In honor of Black History Month, the National Archives displays
- 20 the Emancipation Proclamation that was signed by President Abraham Lincoln on
- 21 January 1, 1863, which proclaimed the freedom of America's slaves; and
- WHEREAS, Museums such as the Museum of African American History, in
- 23 Detroit, Michigan, provide a vivid blueprint of the history of slavery, of the upward
- 24 striving of an oppressed people, their continuing quest for education and knowledge,
- 25 and the sad epidemic of contemporary violence that threatens to annihilate many of
- 26 the descendants of these courageous people; and
- 27 WHEREAS, Museums such as the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum,
- 28 in Washington, D.C. dedicated to presenting the history of the persecution and

- 1 murder of 6 million Jews and millions of other victims of Nazi tyranny, inspire visitors
- 2 to contemplate the moral implications of their choices and responsibilities as citizens
- 3 in an interdependent world; and
- 4 WHEREAS, A museum dedicated to the black slavery holocaust would exhibit to
- 5 the world the results of man's inhumanity to man, and the moral costs to descendants
- 6 of slaveholder and slave alike, and would illustrate the reality of this bloody period in
- 7 American history to those who might belittle or wish to forget the horrific conditions
- 8 that gave birth to the legacy of racial intolerance that plagues our society; now,
- 9 therefore, be it
- 10 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the
- 11 General Assembly endorses and supports the efforts of Black Slavery Holocaust
- 12 Memorial, Inc., to raise funds for the purchase of land on which to erect a memorial
- 13 dedicated to the black slavery holocaust; and be it further
