# FISCAL NOTE Revised

House Bill 312 (Delegate Arnick. et al.)

**Economic Matters** 

### Baltimore County - Alcoholic Beverages - Additional Class B Licenses

This bill changes the seating capacity requirement and the percentage of alcoholic beverage sales necessary for a restaurant to qualify for a fourth Class B, beer, wine, and liquor license. Currently, a restaurant must have a minimum seating capacity of 250 persons for dining and less than 15% of its total sales in alcohol in order to qualify for a fourth license. This bill lowers the required seating capacity to 190 and raises the percentage of sales in alcohol to no more than 20% of total sales.

This bill is effective June 1, 1998.

#### **Fiscal Summary**

**State Effect:** None.

**Local Effect:** None. The bill would not increase the number of Class B licenses available, therefore no additional revenue would be generated from licensing fees. Monitoring of licensees could be handled with the existing resources of the board of license commissioners.

**Small Business Effect:** Minimal effect on small businesses.

### **Fiscal Analysis**

**Local Effect:** There are no more Class B, beer, wine, and liquor licenses available in Baltimore County. A restaurant or hotel seeking a fourth license and meeting the bill's seating capacity and sales criteria, would have to obtain an existing license by purchasing the license from another Class B licensee. Currently, there are 260 Class B, beer, wine, and liquor licenses in Baltimore County.

**Small Business Effect:** To the extent that holders of Class B licenses meet the seating capacity and alcohol sales criteria and obtain a fourth license, new small businesses could be created in Baltimore County. Although the number of such licensees that are small businesses is unknown, a vast majority would fall into that category. Increasing the number of licenses issued to a restaurant could negatively impact those restaurants which do not meet the alcohol sales criteria by not allowing them to expand.
