A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 State Personnel - Contractual Employees - Transfers to Budgeted Positions

- 3 FOR the purpose of providing that if a contractual employee has been employed in a
- 4 contractual position for a continuous period of 18 months, the contractual
- 5 position shall be replaced by a budgeted position and the contractual employee
- 6 shall be allowed to transfer to the budgeted position.

- 12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
- 13 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

14 Article - State Personnel and Pensions

15 13-302.

- 16 (A) [If] SUBJECT TO SUBSECTION (B) OF THIS SECTION, IF a contractual
- 7 position is replaced by a budgeted position, a contractual employee in the contractual
- 18 position may transfer to the budgeted position, if:
- 19 (1) the employee meets the minimum qualifications for the budgeted
- 20 position and has at least 6 continuous months of satisfactory service as of the date on
- 21 which the replacement occurs;
- 22 (2) there is a continuing need for the function to be performed;
- 23 (3) the agency can document a competitive hiring process; and
- 24 (4) the budgeted position replacing the contractual position was not
- 25 available at the time the contractual employee was hired.

- 1 (B) IF A CONTRACTUAL EMPLOYEE HAS BEEN EMPLOYED IN A CONTRACTUAL
- 2 POSITION FOR A CONTINUOUS PERIOD OF 18 MONTHS, THE CONTRACTUAL POSITION
- 3 SHALL BE REPLACED BY A BUDGETED POSITION AND THE CONTRACTUAL EMPLOYEE
- 4 SHALL BE ALLOWED TO TRANSFER TO THE BUDGETED POSITION.
- 5 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
- 6 October 1, 1999.
