House Bill 309 (Delegates Healey and Hixson)

Appropriations

Education - Limitation on Tuition at Public Institutions of Higher Education

This bill provides that a public institution of higher education in the State may not charge for tuition more than 10% of the median family income in the State.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: St. Mary's College of Maryland tuition revenues (current unrestricted funds) would decrease by approximately \$1.2 million in FY 2000. Out-year tuition revenue losses reflect inflation and enrollment increases. No direct effect on expenditures.

Fiscal Analysis

State Revenues: This analysis assumes that the bill's tuition limitation would only apply to undergraduate full-time resident (in-State) tuition. It is further assumed that the limitation would be effective for all of fiscal 2000 and thereafter.

The 1998 estimated statewide household median income was \$48,900. With the exception of

St. Mary's College of Maryland, fiscal 2000 undergraduate full-time resident tuition at each Maryland public higher education institution is below \$4,890, and is not expected to exceed 10% of the projected State median family income before fiscal 2005. The fiscal 2000 undergraduate full-time resident tuition rates at State public institutions are listed below.

Using projected tuition, income, and enrollment figures, it is estimated that St. Mary's would lose \$1,171,008 in tuition revenues in fiscal 2000 as a result of the bill. Tuition revenue loss for St. Mary's is projected to increase to \$2,030,790 in fiscal 2004.

The Governor's proposed fiscal 2000 budget includes an allowance of \$11,156,653 for tuition and fees revenue for St. Mary's College.
