HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A House Joint Resolution concerning

2 Oxygenated Fuel

- 3 FOR the purpose of requesting the United States Congress to repeal certain fuel
- 4 oxygenate content requirements in the federal Clean Air Act and to encourage
- 5 reliance instead upon clean-burning, non-oxygenate fuel formulations that
- 6 meet the air quality standards established in the Clean Air Act; urging the U.S.
- 7 Environmental Protection Agency to provide more aggressive enforcement and
- 8 oversight of federal underground storage tank regulations in order to protect the
- 9 groundwater and surface waters of the State; directing that copies of this
- 10 Resolution be forwarded to certain persons; and generally relating to
- 11 oxygenated fuel.
- WHEREAS, The 1990 amendments to the federal Clean Air Act (CAA)
- 13 mandated the addition of oxygenates in reformulated gasoline (RFG) at a minimum of
- 14 2% of content by weight to reduce the concentration of various types of air
- 15 contaminants, including ozone and carbon monoxide, in regions of the country
- 16 exceeding National Ambient Air Quality Standards; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Methyl tertiary-butyl ether (MtBE), the most commonly used
- 18 gasoline oxygenate in the United States and Maryland, is being detected with
- 19 increasing frequency in surface and groundwater supplies and public and private
- 20 water supply wells throughout the United States due to leaking underground
- 21 petroleum storage tanks, spills, and other accidental discharges; and
- WHEREAS, Because MtBE is highly soluble in water, spills and leaks
- 23 involving MtBE-laden gasoline are considerably more expensive and difficult to
- 24 remediate than those involving conventional gasoline, and current wellhead
- 25 techniques for treating gasoline-tainted water, such as air sparging and carbon
- 26 filtration, are less effective in treating water contaminated by MtBE-laden gasoline,
- 27 resulting in increased treatment costs to water suppliers; and
- 28 WHEREAS, Several studies, including the May 1999 study on "The
- 29 Ozone-Forming Potential of Reformulated Gasoline" by the National Research
- 30 Council, have found that gasoline oxygenates contribute little to reducing ozone
- 31 pollution and that the air quality benefits of oxygenates in reformulated gasoline are
- 32 restricted to cars manufactured prior to 1989 and, therefore, are diminishing as older
- 33 model vehicles are phased out; and

- 1 WHEREAS, A "Blue Ribbon Panel" of the U.S. Environmental Protection
- 2 Agency called for the elimination of the federal oxygenate requirement and for the
- 3 reduction of the use of MtBE in gasoline because of the public health concerns
- 4 associated with MtBE in water supplies; and
- 5 WHEREAS, The prescriptive requirements in the Clean Air Act Amendments
- 6 for oxygenate content restrict the State's ability to address groundwater
- 7 contamination and air quality issues; now, therefore, be it
- 8 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND. That the United
- 9 States Congress is urged to repeal the oxygenate content requirements in the Clean
- 10 Air Act, and to encourage reliance instead upon clean-burning, non-oxygenate fuel
- 11 formulations that meet the air quality standards established in the Clean Air Act and
- 12 provide reductions of ozone and airborne toxic pollutants equivalent to or greater
- 13 than gasoline oxygenates; and be it further
- 14 RESOLVED, That the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is urged to provide
- 15 more aggressive enforcement and provide more complete oversight of federal
- 16 underground storage tank (UST) regulations, including requiring the upgrading of all
- 17 USTs as well as strengthening other release prevention and detection requirements
- 18 in order to protect both the groundwater and surface waters of the State; and be it
- 19 further
