1 AN ACT concerning

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Discount Assistance Card Programs - Operation

3 FOR the purpose of repealing the requirement that the Secretary of Aging operate a

- 4 "Golden Age Card" Program for individuals who are 65 years of age or older or
- 5 disabled; requiring the Office for Individuals with Disabilities to operate a
- 6 "Disability Access Card" Program for individuals who are disabled; prohibiting
- 7 the Director of the Office from charging a fee for a disability access card;
- 8 requiring the Director to adopt certain regulations; defining a certain term; and
- 9 generally relating to operating discount <u>assistance</u> card programs.

8 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 9 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

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Article 70B - Department of Aging

11 4.

12 [(d) (1) The Secretary shall establish a "Golden Age Card" Program and 13 provide a Golden Age Card to any resident of the State who applies to the Department 14 for a card and who is 65 years of age or older or disabled. The Secretary shall 15 encourage voluntary programs to provide assistance of any kind to card holders, and 16 encourage support and participation in them by all persons. Card holders shall be 17 entitled to any assistance granted to them by and through these voluntary programs, 18 the laws of this State, or ordinances or resolutions of political subdivisions; however, 19 this subsection does not require any person or organization to provide any assistance 20 to card holders. The Secretary shall establish and charge a fee of \$1 to accompany 21 application for a card.

22 (2) Before issuing a Golden Age Card to any person, the Secretary shall 23 establish the identity of the person who applies for a card and shall ascertain that the 24 person is eligible to receive the card. The Secretary shall adopt regulations to prevent 25 the issuance of cards to persons not eligible to have them. Cards shall contain the 26 signature of the card holder and any other information the Secretary considers 27 necessary to carry out the purposes of the Golden Age Card Program. Any card that 28 the Secretary issues may be held in perpetuity by the original card holder and may 29 not be transferable to any other person. A person who loses his card may obtain 30 another card from the Department upon providing the same information as was 31 required for the issuance of the original card.

32 (3) A card holder may not use a Golden Age Card except to obtain a33 benefit to which the holder is entitled under the conditions of the offer.

34 (4) As used in this subsection, "disabled person" means a person who has
35 been certified as permanently and totally disabled by an agency of this State or the
36 United States having the function of so classifying persons.]

37 [(e)] (D) With respect to assisted living programs, as defined under § 19-1801
38 of the Health - General Article, the Secretary shall:

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1 (1)Develop assisted living programs for the elderly, in conjunction with 2 any public or private profit or nonprofit corporation or any State or federal agency; Make maximum use of rent and other subsidies available from 3 (2)4 federal and State sources and provide for subsidies necessary from State general 5 funds to assist low income elderly individuals to reside in assisted living programs as 6 an alternative to more costly, but not required, institutional care; 7 (3) Find sponsors for assisted living programs; 8 (4)Assist developers in formulating design concepts and meeting 9 program needs; 10 (5)When necessary and in accordance with available funds, provide 11 subsidies for congregate meals, housekeeping, and personal services for assisted 12 living programs and develop eligibility requirements in connection with these 13 subsidies; 14 (6)Adopt regulations governing eligibility requirements for subsidies; 15 and 16 Review the compliance of assisted living programs with the (7)17 regulations adopted by the Secretary of Health and Mental Hygiene for licensing these programs to operate in the State. 18 19 **Article - State Government** 20 9-1105. 21 The Office shall: 22 identify and evaluate the programs and services for individuals with (1)23 disabilities in the State: 24 collect information to identify programs and services that individuals (2)25 with disabilities need; identify barriers to the delivery of adequate services and recommend 26 (3)procedures to remove the barriers; 27 28 develop an information and referral service for programs and services (4) 29 for individuals with disabilities; foster coordination of and support for public and private agencies 30 (5)31 that provide programs and services to individuals with disabilities; 32 promote the designation of local or regional offices to coordinate (6)33 services to individuals with disabilities;

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1 (7) monitor and encourage State government compliance with laws and 2 policies affecting individuals with disabilities, and recommend changes on behalf of 3 individuals with disabilities;

4 (8) submit to the Governor and, subject to § 2-1246 of this article, to the 5 members of the General Assembly an annual report that:

6 (i) gives the status of these programs and services;

7 (ii) makes recommendations for more effective delivery of the

8 services; and

9 (iii) provides updated information on implementation by the Office 10 of the federal Americans with Disabilities Act;

11 (9) support the Council in performance of its duties; [and]

12 (10) annually recommend to the Department of Budget and Management 13 capital budget projects for inclusion in the capital budget to promote access to

14 State-owned facilities for individuals with disabilities; AND

15 (11) ESTABLISH A "DISABILITY ACCESS CARD" PROGRAM IN ACCORDANCE 16 WITH § 9-1105.1 OF THIS SUBTITLE.

18 (A) IN THIS SECTION, "DISABLED PERSON INDIVIDUAL" MEANS A PERSON AN
19 INDIVIDUAL WHO HAS BEEN CERTIFIED AS PERMANENTLY AND TOTALLY DISABLED
20 BY AN AGENCY A UNIT OF THE STATE OR THE UNITED STATES HAVING THE
21 FUNCTION OF SO CLASSIFYING PERSONS THAT CLASSIFIES DISABLED INDIVIDUALS.

22 (B) (1) (I) THE DIRECTOR SHALL ESTABLISH A "DISABILITY ACCESS CARD" 23 PROGRAM. AND

24 (II) <u>THE DIRECTOR SHALL</u> PROVIDE A DISABILITY ACCESS CARD TO
 25 ANY RESIDENT OF <u>AN APPLICANT WHO RESIDES IN</u> THE STATE WHO APPLIES TO THE
 26 DEPARTMENT FOR A CARD AND WHO IS <u>A</u> DISABLED <u>INDIVIDUAL</u>.

27 (2) (I) THE DIRECTOR SHALL ENCOURAGE VOLUNTARY PROGRAMS TO 28 PROVIDE ASSISTANCE OF ANY KIND TO <u>DISABILITY ACCESS</u> CARD HOLDERS, AND.

29 (II) <u>THE DIRECTOR SHALL</u> ENCOURAGE <u>ALL PERSONS TO</u> SUPPORT
 30 AND <u>PARTICIPATION IN THEM BY ALL PERSONS TO PARTICIPATE IN VOLUNTARY</u>
 31 <u>PROGRAMS OF ASSISTANCE TO DISABILITY ACCESS CARD HOLDERS</u>.

32 (II) (3) THIS SUBSECTION DOES NOT REQUIRE ANY PERSON OR
 33 ORGANIZATION TO PROVIDE ANY ASSISTANCE TO <u>DISABILITY ACCESS</u> CARD
 34 HOLDERS.

35 (C) <u>DISABILITY ACCESS</u> CARD HOLDERS SHALL BE ENTITLED TO ANY
 36 ASSISTANCE GRANTED TO THEM BY AND THROUGH VOLUNTARY PROGRAMS, THE

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LAWS OF THE STATE, OR AND ORDINANCES OR RESOLUTIONS OF POLITICAL
 SUBDIVISIONS OF THE STATE.

3 (D) THE DIRECTOR SHALL ESTABLISH AND <u>MAY NOT</u> CHARGE A FEE OF \$1 TO 4 ACCOMPANY APPLICATION FOR A <u>DISABILITY ACCESS</u> CARD.

5 (E) (1) BEFORE ISSUING A DISABILITY ACCESS CARD TO ANY PERSON AN
6 INDIVIDUAL, THE DIRECTOR SHALL ESTABLISH THE IDENTITY OF THE PERSON
7 INDIVIDUAL WHO APPLIES FOR A DISABILITY ACCESS CARD AND SHALL ASCERTAIN
8 THAT WHETHER THE PERSON INDIVIDUAL IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE THE CARD A
9 DISABILITY ACCESS CARD.

(2) CARDS <u>A DISABILITY ACCESS CARD</u> SHALL CONTAIN THE SIGNATURE
 OF THE CARD HOLDER AND ANY OTHER INFORMATION THE DIRECTOR CONSIDERS
 NECESSARY TO CARRY OUT THE PURPOSES OF THE DISCOUNT DISABILITY ACCESS
 CARD PROGRAM.

14 (3) ANY <u>A DISABILITY ACCESS</u> CARD THAT THE DIRECTOR ISSUES
 15 <u>ISSUED BY THE DIRECTOR</u> MAY BE HELD IN PERPETUITY BY THE ORIGINAL CARD
 16 HOLDER AND MAY <u>IS</u> NOT BE TRANSFERABLE TO ANY OTHER PERSON.

(4) <u>A PERSON AN INDIVIDUAL</u> WHO LOSES <u>HIS A DISABILITY ACCESS</u>
 CARD MAY OBTAIN ANOTHER <u>DISABILITY ACCESS</u> CARD FROM THE OFFICE <u>UPON</u> <u>ON</u>
 PROVIDING THE SAME INFORMATION AS WAS REQUIRED FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE
 ORIGINAL CARD.

21 (F) <u>A CARD A DISABILITY ACCESS CARD HOLDER MAY NOT USE A DISABILITY</u>
22 ACCESS CARD EXCEPT TO OBTAIN A BENEFIT TO WHICH THE HOLDER IS ENTITLED
23 UNDER THE CONDITIONS OF THE OFFER.

24 (G) THE DIRECTOR SHALL ADOPT REGULATIONS NECESSARY TO CARRY OUT 25 THE PROVISIONS OF THIS SECTION.

26 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take 27 effect October 1, 2000.
