20 21	SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

24 25	(a) An individual may obtain a high school diploma by examination as provided in this section if he:

Has not obtained a high school certificate or diploma;

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	(2) Has resided in this State or on a federal reservation in this State for at least 3 months, except that the State Board may waive this residence requirement if it considers the waiver justified;	
4	(3) Is [16] 18 years old or older; and	
5 6	(4) Has withdrawn from a regular full-time public or private school program for at least 3 months.

10 11	(a) (1) (I) Except as otherwise provided in this section, each child who resides in this State and is 5 years old or older and under [16] 18 shall attend a public school regularly during the entire school year unless the child is otherwise receiving regular, thorough instruction during the school year in the studies usually taught in the public schools to children of the same age.	
	(II) A CHILD UNDER THE AGE OF 18 YEARS WHO HAS OBTAINED HIGH SCHOOL CERTIFICATE OR DIPLOMA IS NOT SUBJECT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THIS SUBSECTION.	F
18 19	(2) In accordance with regulations of the State Board of Education, a child who resides in this State and is 5 years old may be exempted from mandatory school attendance for 1 year if the child's parent or guardian files a written request with the local school system asking that the child's attendance be delayed due to the child's level of maturity.	
23 24	(3) Except as provided in subsection (f) of this section or in regulations of the State Board of Education, each child who resides in this State shall attend a kindergarten program regularly during the school year prior to entering the first grade unless the child is otherwise receiving regular, thorough instruction in the skills and studies usually taught in a kindergarten program of a public school.	
	(c) Each person who has legal custody or care and control of a child who is 5 years old or older and under [16] 18 shall see that the child attends school or receives instruction as required by this section.	
29 30	(d) (1) This section applies to any child who has a mental, emotional, or physical handicap.	
31	(2) This section does not apply to a child:	
32 33	(i) Whose mental, emotional, or physical condition makes his instruction detrimental to his progress; or	
34 35	(ii) Whose presence in school presents a danger of serious physical harm to others.	
36 37	(3) With the advice of the school principal, supervisor, pupil personnel supervisor, or visiting teacher and with the written recommendation of a licensed	

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1 physician or a State Department of Education certified or licensed psychologist, the 2 county superintendent may: Make other appropriate provisions for the free education of any 4 student excepted from attendance under paragraph (2) of this subsection; or Permit the parents or guardians of that student to withdraw 6 him from public school, for as long as the attendance of the child in a public school would be detrimental to his progress or his presence in school would present a danger 8 of serious physical harm to others. 9 If a child is withdrawn from a public school under this subsection, the 10 county board shall make other appropriate provisions for the education of the child. 11 If an appropriate educational placement is not available immediately, 12 the county board shall make interim provisions for the education of the child until an 13 appropriate placement becomes available. 14 Any person who induces or attempts to induce a child to absent (e) (1) 15 himself unlawfully from school or employs or harbors any child who is absent 16 unlawfully from school while school is in session is guilty of a misdemeanor and on 17 conviction is subject to a fine not to exceed \$500 or imprisonment not to exceed 30 18 days, or both. 19 (2) Any person who has legal custody or care and control of a child who is 20 5 years old or older and under [16] 18 who fails to see that the child attends school or 21 receives instruction under this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and: 22 For a first conviction is subject to a fine not to exceed \$50 per 23 day of unlawful absence or imprisonment not to exceed 10 days, or both; and 24 For a second or subsequent conviction is subject to a fine not to (ii) 25 exceed \$100 per day of unlawful absence or imprisonment not to exceed 30 days, or 26 both. 27 As to any sentence imposed under this section, the court may (3) 28 suspend the fine or the prison sentence and establish terms and conditions which 29 would promote the child's attendance. The suspension authority provided for in this 30 subsection is in addition to and not in limitation of the suspension authority under 31 Article 27, § 641A of the Code. SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 32 33 July 1, 2000.
