- 4 FOR the purpose of creating the Judith P. Hoyer Blue Ribbon Commission on the
- 5 Financing of Early Child Care and Education; providing for the purpose, duties,
- and membership of the Commission; providing for the terms and compensation
- of its members; providing for the appointment of its members; requiring the
- 8 Commission to meet at certain times and issue reports on or before certain
- 9 dates; providing for the termination of the Commission and the termination of
- this Act; and generally relating to the creation of a Commission charged with
- studying the financing of early child care and education in the State.
- 12 Preamble
- 13 WHEREAS, Maryland's greatest resource is its children; and
- WHEREAS, Maryland's youngest children must receive an early child care
- 15 and education that provide a safe, nurturing, educational, and culturally affirming
- 16 environment, in order to ensure that they enter the school system prepared to
- 17 succeed: and
- WHEREAS, In 1999, the State annual average cost for full-time child care for
- 19 a child 5 years or younger was \$6,112; and
- WHEREAS, Nationally, approximately 60% of the \$40 billion spent annually
- 21 on early child care and education is paid by the families of those children; and
- WHEREAS, The vast majority of the money spent goes to pay for direct
- 23 services to children, with only a small percentage supporting infrastructure, such as
- 24 quality assurance and capital costs for facilities; and
- 25 WHEREAS, A growing body of research has revealed the critical importance of
- 26 early child care and education to later achievement and learning; and
- 27 WHEREAS, While the State and federal governments support public
- 28 education and provide substantial support to public colleges, and State and federal

- 1 governments make substantial contributions targeted to early child care and
- 2 education for low-income families, public funding of early child care and education for
- 3 middle-income families is minimal; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Nationally, experts in financing are reviewing new approaches to
- 5 funding early child care and education services, including approaches modeled after
- 6 the funding mechanisms used for higher education; and
- WHEREAS, A blue ribbon commission created by the State would make
- 8 possible an intensive review of innovative approaches to funding early child care and
- 9 education, including approaches modeled after methods used in financing higher
- 10 education, transportation, and housing; now, therefore,
- 11 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
- 12 MARYLAND, That:
- 13 (a) There is a Judith P. Hoyer Blue Ribbon Commission on the Financing of
- 14 Early Child Care and Education.
- 15 (b) The purpose of the Commission is to examine the costs and availability of
- 16 funding for early child care and education.
- 17 (c) The Commission shall:
- 18 (1) determine the total costs of early child care and education;
- 19 (2) develop a coherent funding structure for early child care and
- 20 education in Maryland, which may include:
- 21 (i) a tiered reimbursement system for the purchase of early child
- 22 care and education, under which providers would be reimbursed at scheduled
- 23 percentages of and above market rates;
- 24 (ii) incentives for providers and programs, including wage
- 25 supplements and retention grants, that are linked to the educational attainments of
- 26 children receiving early child care and education; or
- 27 (iii) the inclusion of early child care and education, or at least
- 28 prekindergarten programs, in the State education funding formula;
- 29 (3) review and identify the sources for any available and potentially
- 30 available funding from the federal government for early child care and education;
- 31 (4) review and identify potentially available public and private funding
- 32 sources, other than the federal government, for early child care and education;
- 33 (5) identify methods for reducing the costs to middle-income parents of
- 34 early child care and education; and
- 35 (6) develop a specific plan and time line for implementation of programs
- 36 developed.
