#### **Firearms - Disposal Requirements for Law Enforcement Agencies**

This bill requires a State or local law enforcement agency to destroy unnecessary, unneeded, or forfeited firearms, including assault pistols, assault weapons, handguns, short-barreled shotguns, short-barreled rifles, and machine guns. The bill establishes exceptions to the destruction requirement, including a firearm retained by a law enforcement agency for official use, a firearm that may be or is being used as evidence, and a firearm that a retiring State police officer is allowed to keep or acquire.

### **Fiscal Summary**

**State Effect:** The requirements of this bill could be handled by affected State agencies with existing budgeted resources.

**Local Effect:** Potential significant expenditure increases in some jurisdictions. Revenues would not be affected.

Small Business Effect: Minimal.

## Analysis

**Current Law:** While some seized weapons are allowed to be destroyed, there is no requirement to do so.

**Local Expenditures:** Most jurisdictions surveyed by the Department of Legislative Services reported that this bill generally codifies current practice or local laws. However, Anne Arundel County reports that this bill, in a department-wide upgrade of weapons, could cost the county \$65,000 to destroy old weapons and not allow for a trade-in value on a new

purchase. The cost of upgrading the weapons is estimated to be about \$390,000. These costs are based on an estimated \$100 each to dispose of 650 covered weapons, and a purchase price of \$600 for each of 650 new weapons. The county advises that the department-wide upgrade in fiscal 1998 realized "a trade-in value equal to the cost of the new weapons" as a result of negotiations with the seller. It is not known how many other jurisdictions might fall within the same such circumstance.
