#### **Circuit Courts - Business and Technology Division**

This bill establishes a 19-member Business and Technology Division Task Force to study the feasibility of the establishment of a business and technology division in appropriate circuit courts in the State. The task force is to be chaired by the President of the Maryland State Bar Association or designee and must issue a final report addressing specified items by December 1, 2000.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2000 and sunsets June 30, 2001.

#### **Fiscal Summary**

**State Effect:** The bill does not address staffing for the task force. Assuming staffing is provided by the Maryland State Bar Association, a non-profit organization, State finances would not be affected.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

### Analysis

Current Law: There are currently no business and technology courts in Maryland.

Background: This bill recognizes the growing role of electronic commerce in Maryland and

the rest of the country and the increasingly complex and technical issues involved. Delaware has demonstrated the advantage of having a designated court structure for business issues in attracting corporate headquarters to the state. California has developed guidelines for handling complex legal issues in its courts, but no state has set up a forum especially for handling technology disputes.
