## FISCAL NOTE Revised

House Bill 805 (Delegate Schisler)

**Environmental Matters** 

#### **Hunting - Recovery of Killed, Wounded, or Injured Deer - Use of Dogs**

The bill requires the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to adopt regulations governing the use of dogs to aid in the prompt recovery of killed, wounded, or injured deer. Except as provided in those regulations, a person may not take a dog into the woods or possess or control a dog in the woods and use the dog to hunt or pursue deer. The bill also prohibits a person from killing a dog found pursuing a deer in Baltimore, Harford, Howard, Montgomery, Prince George's, Somerset, and Worcester counties. In all other counties, any Natural Resources police officer, law enforcement officer, or any other person may kill any dog pursuing deer, except in accordance with the regulations adopted pursuant to the bill.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2000.

## **Fiscal Summary**

**State Effect:** The bill would not materially affect State operations or finances. Enforcement could be handled with existing resources.

### **Analysis**

Current Law: A person is not allowed to take a dog into the woods or possess or control a dog in the woods and use the dog to hunt deer. In all counties except Baltimore, Harford, Howard, Montgomery, Prince George's, Somerset, and Worcester counties, any Natural Resources police officer, law enforcement officer, or any other person may kill any dog found pursuing any deer. In several specified counties, dogs that are engaged in fox hunting and who have broken away may not be killed.

**Background:** Currently, the use of dogs for trailing wounded deer is allowed in 17 states.
