Ways and Means

### **Education - Principals and Administrators - Mentor Programs**

This bill enables local school systems to receive State grants for expanding and developing mentor programs serving principals and administrators. Public schools in which 50% or more of the principals and administrators have five years or less of administrative experience would be designated as a funding priority.

This bill takes effect June 1, 2000.

### **Fiscal Summary**

**State Effect:** None. Overall State funding for mentoring programs would not change.

Local Effect: None.

**Small Business Effect:** None.

## **Analysis**

**Current Law:** Chapter 600 of 1999, the Quality Teacher Incentive Act of 1999, includes a provision that provides competitive grants to local boards of education for expansion of mentor programs for newly hired teachers, with funding priority targeted to programs in atrisk schools.

Local boards of education must submit a plan on the use of mentoring funds to the State Superintendent of Schools. The State Superintendent must give priority to plans targeting funds to schools in which 40% of the students receive free or reduced price meals and in which 50% or more of the teachers have five years or less of teaching experience or student achievement scores on local, State, and national assessments are at or below a satisfactory level. Total funding for mentoring programs cannot exceed \$5 million annually.

**Background:** The proposed fiscal 2001 budget includes \$5 million to local school systems to expand existing teacher mentoring programs in public schools serving at-risk students.
