A BILL ENTITLED

1	AN ACT concerning
2	Virginia-Maryland-District of Columbia Joint Legislative Commission on
3	Interstate Transportation - Regional Transportation Authority Study
4	FOR the purpose of requesting the Virginia-Maryland-District of Columbia Joint
5	Legislative Commission on Interstate Transportation to study the issue of
6	establishing a Regional Transportation Authority; requesting the Speaker of the
7	House, the President of the Senate and their Virginia and District of Columbia
8	counterparts to consider a certain expansion of the Commission; requesting the
9	Commission to submit a certain report on or before a certain date; and generally
10	relating to the Virginia-Maryland-District of Columbia Joint Legislative
11	Commission on Interstate Transportation.
12	Preamble
13	WHEREAS, Residents in the Metropolitan Washington Region, particularly
14	those in Northern Virginia and suburban Maryland, face the second longest daily

- 15 commutes in the United States, with only Los Angeles area residents spending more 16 time each day commuting to work; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Residents in the Metropolitan Washington Region have the highest 18 per capita income lost because of transportation gridlock and pay nearly \$1,260 per
- 19 year in higher consumer prices because of the effects of traffic congestion; and
- WHEREAS, By the year 2020, trips to or from work will increase by 2.5 million 20
- 21 per day, for a total of 6.1 million trips per day with suburb-to-suburb work trips
- 22 accounting for 3 of every 4 work trips; and
- 23 WHEREAS, By the year 2020, traffic volumes across existing bridges in the
- 24 Metropolitan Washington Region will carry more than 400,000 trips above design
- 25 capacity each day, yet Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia have had
- 26 difficulty coordinating long term regional transportation and related growth policies;
- 27 and

- WHEREAS, Although there is frequent and beneficial coordination among
- 2 executive branch officials and local government officials in Maryland, Virginia, and
- 3 the District of Columbia, a more formal structure for coordinating transportation
- 4 solutions may be beneficial in improving transportation and mobility for residents of
- 5 the Metropolitan Washington Region, particularly residents of Northern Virginia and
- 6 suburban Maryland; and
- WHEREAS, Because of the increasing amount of commuter traffic between the
- 8 Metropolitan Washington Region and Baltimore, discussions of a Regional
- 9 Transportation Authority would be aided on the Maryland side by the addition of a
- 10 House and Senate representative from the Baltimore area; now, therefore,

11 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF

- 12 MARYLAND, That
- 13 (a) The Virginia-Maryland-District of Columbia Joint Legislative
- 14 Commission on Interstate Transportation is requested to study the issue of
- 15 establishing a Regional Transportation Authority for the Metropolitan Washington
- 16 Region, including in the study a review of such issues as:
- 17 (1) the funding of transportation projects;
- 18 (2) transportation capacity;
- 19 (3) transit alternatives;
- 20 (4) Potomac River crossings;
- 21 (5) coordination of land use policies;
- 22 (6) air pollution control policies; and
- 23 (7) other issues the Commission believes are relevant to a Regional
- 24 Transportation Authority.
- 25 (b) The Maryland Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate shall
- 26 discuss with their appropriate counterparts in Virginia and the District of Columbia
- 27 the advisability of expanding the membership of the Commission to a slightly broader
- 28 geographic area in both Maryland and Virginia.
- 29 (c) It is the intent of the General Assembly that the Commission report its
- 30 findings and recommendations to the General Assembly in accordance with § 2-1246
- 31 of the State Government Article in time to submit its findings and recommendations
- 32 to the Governors of Maryland and Virginia, the Mayor and Council of the District of
- 33 Columbia, and the General Assemblies of Maryland and Virginia, prior to their
- 34 respective 2002 legislative sessions.
- 35 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
- 36 October 1, 2001.
