Preamble

22 WHEREAS, Respite is the occasional, short-term, temporary relief or rest for

23 family caregivers who provide care for children or adults with developmental

24 disabilities, functional disabilities, challenging behaviors, and age related disorders 25 and diseases; and

WHEREAS, Supporting the efforts of families and caregivers to care forindividuals with special needs at home is efficient, cost effective, and humane; and

28 WHEREAS, Families receiving occasional caregiver support services are less 29 likely to request institutional care at public expense for an individual with special

1 WHEREAS, Caregiver support services reduce family and caregiver stress,

 $2\;$ enhance family and caregiver coping ability, and strengthen family ability to meet the

3 challenging demands of caring for individuals with special needs; and

4 WHEREAS, Caregiver support services reduce the risk of abuse and neglect of 5 children, senior citizens, and other vulnerable groups; and

6 WHEREAS, Coordinated, noncategorical caregiver support services must be 7 available locally to provide reliable short-term relief when it is needed by families 8 and caregivers regardless of where they live in Maryland; now, therefore,

9 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF10 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

13 (A) (1) THERE IS A MARYLAND CAREGIVERS SUPPORT COORDINATING 14 COUNCIL OF MARYLAND IN THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES.

15 (2) THE PURPOSE OF THE COUNCIL IS TO COORDINATE STATEWIDE
16 PLANNING, DEVELOPMENT, AND IMPLEMENTATION OF FAMILY CAREGIVER

18 (B) (1) THE COUNCIL SHALL CONSIST OF THE FOLLOWING MEMBERS, 19 APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR:

20 (I) ONE REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN 21 RESOURCES;

22 (II) THREE REPRESENTATIVES FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF 23 HEALTH AND MENTAL HYGIENE;

24 (III) ONE REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF AGING;

25 (IV) ONE REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE GOVERNOR'S OFFICE FOR 26 INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES;

27 (V) ONE REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE MARYLAND RESPITE CARE 28 COALITION;

29 (VI) TWO CONSUMERS OF RESPITE SERVICES;

30 (VII) THREE FAMILY CAREGIVERS; AND

31 (VIII) THREE REPRESENTATIVES OF ORGANIZATIONS THAT PROVIDE
32 OR HAVE INTEREST OR EXPERTISE IN RESPITE SERVICES.

(2) IN APPOINTING MEMBERS TO THE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNOR, TO

THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES SHALL PROVIDE STAFF 12 (5) 13 SUPPORT TO THE COUNCIL, INCLUDING AN INDIVIDUAL FROM THE DEPARTMENT TO 14 SERVE AS EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE COUNCIL. MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL SHALL SERVE WITHOUT 15 (6)16 COMPENSATION EXCEPT THAT THE MEMBERS MAY BE REIMBURSED FOR EXPENSES 17 UNDER THE STANDARD STATE TRAVEL REGULATIONS, AS PROVIDED IN THE STATE 18 BUDGET. 19 (C) THE COUNCIL SHALL: 20 SOLICIT AND GATHER CONCERNS OF CAREGIVERS BY CONDUCTING (1)21 SURVEYS, HOLDING PUBLIC HEARINGS, ESTABLISHING A TELEPHONE HOTLINE FOR 22 PUBLIC ACCESS. AND OTHER APPROPRIATE MEANS: DEVELOP AND DISTRIBUTE TO INTERESTED PARTIES A HANDBOOK 23 (2)24 OF CURRENT AND OTHER FAMILY CAREGIVER SERVICES AVAILABLE IN THE STATE; **REVIEW SUCCESSFUL RESPITE CARE PROGRAMS IN OTHER STATES;** 25 (3) DEVELOP A MODEL FAMILY CAREGIVER SUPPORT PROGRAM THAT 26 (4) 27 INCORPORATES BEST PRACTICES FROM EXISTING PROGRAMS IN THE STATE AND IN 28 OTHER STATES; COORDINATE ACTIVITIES OF EXISTING AND PROPOSED FAMILY 29 (5) 30 CAREGIVER SUPPORT SERVICES AMONG THE STATE AND LOCAL PUBLIC AGENCIES; RESEARCH AVAILABLE FUNDING SOURCES AND EXPLORE 31 (6)32 POSSIBILITIES FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDS; AND 33 (7)IDENTIFY UNMET NEEDS AND PRIORITIES FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDS.

(D) THE COUNCIL SHALL SUBMIT TO THE GOVERNOR AND, SUBJECT TO §
2-1246 OF THE STATE GOVERNMENT ARTICLE, TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY AN
3 ANNUAL REPORT ON ITS ACTIVITIES.

4 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, on or before October 1, 5 2002, the Council shall submit a report to the Governor and, subject to § 2-1246 of the 6 State Government Article, to the General Assembly with a plan of action for family 7 caregiver support services.

8 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 9 July 1, 2001.
