- WHEREAS, Research indicates that smaller school size is the second most
- 14 important factor in creating positive educational outcomes, after socioeconomic
- 15 status; and
- WHEREAS, Research related to school size indicates that elementary and
- 17 middle schools with between 300 and 400 students and secondary schools with
- 18 between 400 and 800 students are more effective than schools with larger student
- 19 populations; and
- 20 WHEREAS, Smaller school size promotes learning and improves grades and
- 21 test scores of students, especially minorities and low income students; and
- WHEREAS, Research shows that school dropout rates decrease in small schools;
- 23 and
- 24 WHEREAS, Student behavioral problems, including truancy, classroom
- 25 disruption, vandalism, aggression, theft, alcohol and substance abuse, and gang
- 26 participation, occur more often in larger schools; and
- 27 WHEREAS, Creating smaller schools and smaller learning communities within
- 28 larger schools promotes school safety; and

**HOUSE BILL 1440** 1 WHEREAS, Small schools reduce the feeling of isolation, allow students to form 2 closer relationships with teachers, and create a sense of student loyalty to and pride 3 in the school; and 4 WHEREAS, Researchers have concluded that the first step in ending secondary 5 school violence is to break through the impersonal atmosphere of large secondary 6 schools by creating smaller learning communities within large schools; and 7 WHEREAS, Research demonstrates that students who attend smaller schools 8 are more likely to participate in extracurricular activities and to participate in a greater variety of extracurricular activities; and WHEREAS, Large schools contribute to negative teacher attitudes and low staff 10 11 morale; and 12 WHEREAS. Small schools can be established in a cost effective manner, as the 13 sheer size of larger schools requires more administrative support; now, therefore, 14 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 15 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows: **Article - Education** 16 17 4-109. 18 Subject to approval by the State Superintendent and in accordance with 19 the applicable bylaws, rules, and regulations of the State Board, a county board may establish a public school if, in its judgment, it is advisable. 21 (b) On approval by the State Superintendent, any school established under 22 this section becomes a part of the State program of public education. 23 With the advice of the county superintendent, the county board shall 24 determine the geographical attendance area for each school established under this 25 section. 26 (D) A COUNTY BOARD SHALL TO THE EXTENT FEASIBLE ESTABLISH, AND THE

27 STATE SUPERINTENDENT SHALL ENCOURAGE THE ESTABLISHMENT OF, NEW 28 PUBLIC SCHOOLS TO SERVE THE FOLLOWING MAXIMUM STUDENT POPULATIONS:

SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect

FOR AN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL - 400 STUDENTS;

FOR A MIDDLE SCHOOL - 600 STUDENTS; AND

FOR A SECONDARY SCHOOL - 800 STUDENTS.
