HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A House Joint Resolution concerning

2 Task Force on Legislative Management

- 3 FOR the purpose of establishing a Task Force on Legislative Management to review
- 4 efforts by other states to manage and better focus on legislative workload;
- 5 requiring the Task Force to hold public hearings and consult with the
- 6 legislatures of other states and with national organizations; requiring the Task
- 7 Force to submit a report and make recommendations regarding legislative rule
- 8 changes, legislation, and constitutional amendments by a certain date;
- 9 providing for the membership and appointment of the Task Force; providing for
- 10 reimbursement for the members of the Task Force; terminating the Task Force
- on a certain date; and generally relating to a Task Force on Legislative
- 12 Management.
- WHEREAS, Over 11,400 bills have been introduced in the Maryland General
- 14 Assembly over the last five legislative sessions, approximately 7,100 in the House of
- 15 Delegates and 4,300 in the State Senate; and
- WHEREAS, The time available to seriously study and understand all legislation
- 17 before the General Assembly diminishes in an inverse proportion to the number of
- 18 bills introduced; and
- 19 WHEREAS, Twenty-one chambers in the 50 legislatures across the country
- 20 have imposed a limit on the number of bills that a member may introduce or request
- 21 to be drafted; and
- WHEREAS, While the Maryland General Assembly's deadline system for
- 23 consideration of legislation does provide some mechanism for moving legislation in a
- 24 timely manner, there remains every session a backlog of important proposals that
- 25 must be considered in the last few hours before adjournment sine die; and
- WHEREAS, Some of the backlog faced at sine die could be eliminated by
- 27 allowing legislation to lay over between sessions in the same legislative term, as is
- 28 allowed by 43 state legislative chambers around the country; and
- WHEREAS, Legislative time is often wasted by the need to completely redraft a
- 30 complicated proposal; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Thirteen legislative chambers around the country have confronted
- 2 the need to deal more expeditiously with complicated proposals by allowing the
- 3 introduction of "short-form" bills that state the intended purpose of the legislation
- 4 and allow the substance to be added at a later date, after hearings are held and the
- 5 standing committee votes an initial consideration of the bill; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Thirty-seven legislative chambers have expedited the legislative
- 7 process by allowing the combination of several individual measures into a new
- 8 committee bill that moves forward in the same legislative session for consideration by
- 9 the full chamber and opposite house, thereby reducing the time needed to approve the
- 10 separate components of the combined measure; and
- 11 WHEREAS, As the workload of the Maryland General Assembly continues to
- 12 grow, and as we enter a new millennium, the time has come to find ways to
- 13 streamline the workload of the legislature and better focus the attention of the
- 14 General Assembly on the most important issues facing the State's citizenry; now,
- 15 therefore, be it
- 16 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That there is a
- 17 Task Force on Legislative Management; and be it further
- 18 RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall review efforts by other states to manage
- 19 and better focus on the legislative workload before their legislatures, including
- 20 mechanisms that:
- 21 (1) limit the number of bills that may be introduced;
- 22 (2) allow the carry-over of bills between legislative sessions within a
- 23 4-year term;
- 24 (3) require that bills move to the opposite chamber earlier in the session
- 25 than is currently required under the Maryland General Assembly's system of
- 26 deadlines:
- 27 (4) permit the introduction of "short-form" bills that may later be
- 28 considered in fuller measure;
- 29 (5) allow the combination of several bills into a committee bill, which
- 30 moves forward on its own for consideration by the full chamber and the opposite
- 31 house; or
- 32 (6) take any other approach that would allow the Maryland General
- 33 Assembly to better manage and focus on the legislative issues important to the
- 34 citizens of Maryland; and be it further
- 35 RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall hold public hearings and consult with
- 36 the legislatures of other states and with national organizations such as the National
- 37 Conference of State Legislatures; and be it further

- 3 **HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 1** 1 RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall consider legislative rule changes, 2 legislation, and constitutional amendments to better enable the Maryland General 3 Assembly to manage and focus on the legislative issues important to the citizens of 4 Maryland; and be it further 5 RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall be composed of 15 members as follows: the President of the State Senate or an individual delegated by the 6 (1) 7 President; the Speaker of the House of Delegates or an individual delegated by 8 9 the Speaker; 10 (3) two chairmen of standing committees in the State Senate, appointed 11 by the President of the Senate; 12 (4) two chairmen of standing committees in the House of Delegates, 13 appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates; 14 (5) the Majority Leader and Minority Leader of the State Senate; the Majority Leader and Minority Leader of the House of Delegates; 15 (6)one member of the minority party, who is a member of the House of 16 17 Delegates and who shall be appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of 18 Delegates; 19 one member of the minority party, who is a member of the State 20 Senate and who shall be appointed by the Minority Leader of the State Senate; 21 one representative of the Governor of Maryland, who shall be 22 appointed by the Governor; 23 (10)one member of the academic community who is knowledgeable about 24 legislative processes around the country, and who is appointed jointly by the 25 President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House; and one member of the academic community in Maryland, who is 26 27 knowledgeable about legislative processes around the country, and who is appointed 28 jointly by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House; and be it further RESOLVED, That the chairman of the Task Force shall be the member of the 29 30 academic community in Maryland appointed jointly by the President of the Senate
- 31 and the Speaker of the House of Delegates; and be it further
- 32 RESOLVED, That the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of
- 33 Delegates shall appoint the two academic members of the Task Force, and the
- chairman from among those members, on or before July 1, 2001; and be it further
- 35 RESOLVED, That the Governor shall appoint the representative of the
- 36 Governor on or before July 1, 2001; and be it further

- 1 RESOLVED, That the Department of Legislative Services shall provide staff 2 support for the Task Force; and be it further
- 3 RESOLVED, That a member of the Task Force:
- 4 (1) may not receive compensation; but
- 5 (2) is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard State 6 Travel Regulations as provided in the State budget; and be it further
- RESOLVED, That on or before December 31, 2001, subject to § 2-1246 of the
- 8 State Government Article, the Task Force shall submit a report of its findings and
- 9 recommendations to the Legislative Policy Committee of the General Assembly; and
- 10 be it further
- 11 RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall terminate January 1, 2002; and be it
- 12 further
- RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be forwarded by the Department of
- 14 Legislative Services to the Honorable Parris N. Glendening, Governor of Maryland;
- 15 the Honorable Thomas V. Mike Miller, Jr., President of the Senate of Maryland; and
- 16 the Honorable Casper R. Taylor, Jr., Speaker of the House of Delegates.
