HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A House Joint Resolution concerning

New Bretton Woods Conference for the Stability of the International Monetary System

4 FOR the purpose of urging the President and Congress of the United States to call for

5 an international conference to create a more stable international monetary

6 system, evaluate the feasibility of anchoring currency values to an element of

7 real reference, propose the creation of new credit lines, and define

8 infrastructure projects of international dimensions.

9 WHEREAS, In 1944, delegates from 44 nations met in Bretton Woods, New

10 Hampshire to redesign the international financial system, and voted to fix exchange

11 rates to the U.S. dollar in order to reduce barriers to trade and create stability in the

12 international monetary system; and

WHEREAS, The Bretton Woods agreement led to a stable internationalmonetary system and to the postwar economic reconstruction; and

15 WHEREAS, That agreement collapsed in 1972 when the United States chose to 16 eliminate the gold standard for the U.S. dollar; and

WHEREAS, Since 1972, the industrialized nations have chosen to let theircurrencies float; and

WHEREAS, While floating currency rates free monetary policies, they reducethe effectiveness of internal fiscal policies; and

WHEREAS, Financial crises have exploded in different areas of the world since
1997 due to a malfunctioning of international monetary policy and international
financial institutions caused by currency speculation; and

WHEREAS, These financial crises have had devastating effects for the
economies of developing countries, and have completely transformed the structure of
the world economy; and

27 WHEREAS, It is the responsibility of the federal government to adopt fiscal,

 $28\,$ tariff, and economic programs that foster and promote industrial growth and

29 economic progress for all citizens of the country; and

1 WHEREAS, The federal government has the Constitutional power and 2 obligation to keep the country's currency strong, and to use whatever means is 3 available to enable U.S. citizens to earn a living wage; and

4 WHEREAS, Another of the major obligations of the federal government is to 5 provide the necessary infrastructure to sustain a profitable industry and economy; 6 and

7 WHEREAS, The federal government has no right to relinquish its8 responsibilities to any international authority or community; now, therefore, be it

9 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the 10 President of the United States and the members of the United States Congress are 11 urged to call for an international "New Bretton Woods Conference" to:

12 (1) create a new international monetary system designed to eliminate 13 speculation in currencies;

14 (2) evaluate the feasibility of anchoring currency values to an element of 15 real reference in order to better control the movement of currency rates;

16 (3) propose the creation of new credit lines designed to develop 17 investments in the sectors of the real economy of each participating nation; and

18 (4) define infrastructure projects of international dimensions; and be it19 further
