- 6 completed a certain sentence imposed upon them; and generally relating to the
- 7 rights of certain felons to register to vote in the State.

13 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF

14 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

17 (a) Except as provided in subsection (b) of this section, an individual may18 become registered to vote if the individual:

19 (1) Is a citizen of the United States;

20 (2) Is at least 18 years old or will be 18 years old on or before the day of 21 the next succeeding general or special election;

- 22 (3) Is a resident of the county as of the day the individual seeks to 23 register; and
- 24 (4) Registers pursuant to this title.
