14 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
15 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

16 **Article - Health Occupations**

17 3-5A-01.

18 (g) (1) "Massage therapy" means the use of manual techniques on soft
19 tissues of the human body including effleurage (stroking), petrissage (kneading),
20 tapotement (tapping), stretching, compression, vibration, and friction, with or
21 without the aid of heat limited to hot packs and heating pads, cold water, or
22 nonlegend topical applications, for the purpose of improving circulation, enhancing

1 muscle relaxation, relieving muscular pain, reducing stress, or promoting health and
2 well-being.

3 (2) "Massage therapy" does not include:

4 (i) The diagnosis or treatment of illness, disease, or injury; [or]

5 (ii) The adjustment, manipulation, or mobilization of any of the
6 articulations of the osseous structures of the body or spine; OR

7 (III) ~~THE PRACTICE OF TECHNIQUES THAT ARE EXECUTED WITH~~
