A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Election Law - Maryland Voter's Bill of Rights**

3 FOR the purpose of establishing a Maryland Voter's Bill of Rights; altering the
4 qualifications for voter registration for certain felons; authorizing a voter to
5 alter the voter's voter registration information in a certain manner; requiring
6 local boards of elections to provide specimen ballots to each voter prior to an
7 election; requiring the State Board of Elections to ensure that certain voting
8 systems meet certain standards and provide the voter, prior to finalizing the
9 voter's ballot, with certain information; repealing certain qualifications
10 regarding voting by absentee ballot; requiring that on election day election
11 officials at polling places have access through the Internet or similar electronic
12 medium to a certain voter registry; prohibiting an election judge at the polling
13 place from requesting or requiring a voter to produce or submit certain
14 identification or information prior to qualifying the individual to vote; and
15 generally relating to the Maryland Voter's Bill of Rights.

21 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
22 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

23 **Article 33 - Election Code**

24 1-201.

25 (A) The intention of this article is that the conduct of elections should inspire
26 public confidence and trust by assuring that:

27 (1) All persons served by the election system are treated fairly and
28 equitably;

1 (2) All qualified persons may register and vote and that those who are
2 not qualified do not vote;

3 (3) Those who administer elections are well-trained, that they serve
4 both those who vote and those who seek votes, and that they put the public interest
5 ahead of partisan interests;

6 (4) Full information on elections is provided to the public, including
7 disclosure of campaign receipts and expenditures;

8 (5) Citizen convenience is emphasized in all aspects of the election
9 process;

10 (6) Security and integrity are maintained in the casting of ballots,
11 canvass of votes, and reporting of election results; and

12 (7) The prevention of fraud and corruption is diligently pursued, and any
13 offenses that occur are prosecuted.

14 (B) IT IS THE FURTHER INTENTION OF THIS ARTICLE THAT THE ELECTION
15 PROCESS AND PROCEDURES IN THE STATE ASSURE THAT:

16 (1) EVERY VOTER HAS EQUAL, FAIR, AND UNINHIBITED ACCESS TO A
17 POLLING PLACE REGARDLESS OF THE VOTER'S RACE, SEX, OR PHYSICAL HANDICAP;

18 (2) EVERY QUALIFIED VOTER WHO HAS SUBMITTED TO A STATE OR
19 LOCAL GOVERNMENT AGENCY AUTHORIZED TO REGISTER OR ASSIST IN THE
20 REGISTRATION OF VOTERS, THE INFORMATION REQUIRED TO QUALIFY THE
21 INDIVIDUAL TO REGISTER TO VOTE, IS NOT DISENFRANCHISED FROM VOTING AT
22 ANY ELECTION;

23 (3) ANY PERSON WHO HAS COMPLETED THE COURT-ORDERED
24 SENTENCE IMPOSED FOR A CONVICTION, INCLUDING PROBATION, PAROLE,
25 COMMUNITY SERVICE, RESTITUTION, AND FINE, SHALL BE DEEMED QUALIFIED TO
26 REGISTER TO VOTE;

27 (4) UPON REQUEST, ANY QUALIFIED VOTER MAY VOTE BY ABSENTEE
28 BALLOT WITHOUT INQUIRY BY ANY ELECTION OFFICIAL;

29 (5) EVERY VOTER HAS ACCESS TO A VOTING SYSTEM THAT IS ACCURATE
30 SO THAT THE VOTER'S RIGHT TO VOTE AND THE VOTER'S ACTUAL VOTE IS NOT
31 COMPROMISED OR INFLUENCED BY THE GEOGRAPHIC OR DEMOGRAPHIC QUALITIES
32 OF THE COUNTY IN WHICH THE VOTER VOTES;

33 (6) ANY VOTING SYSTEM USED IN THE STATE PROVIDES THE VOTER
34 WITH NOTICE AND AN OPPORTUNITY TO CHANGE THE VOTER'S SPECIFIED CHOICES,
35 BEFORE THE VOTER'S BALLOT IS FINALIZED AND CAST, IF:

36 (I) THE VOTER FAILS TO CAST A VOTE FOR ANY OFFICE OR
37 QUESTION FOR WHICH THE VOTER IS ELIGIBLE TO VOTE;

1 (II) THE VOTER CASTS A VOTE FOR A CANDIDATE OR QUESTION
2 FOR WHICH THE VOTER IS INELIGIBLE TO VOTE; OR

3 (III) THE VOTER CASTS A VOTE FOR MORE THAN THE ALLOWABLE
4 NUMBER OF CANDIDATES OR QUESTIONS FOR WHICH THE VOTER IS ELIGIBLE TO
5 VOTE;

6 (7) ON ELECTION DAY, ELECTION OFFICIALS AT EVERY POLLING PLACE
7 HAVE ACCESS THROUGH THE INTERNET OR BY OTHER ELECTRONIC MEDIUM TO A
8 CENTRALIZED VOTER REGISTRY;

9 (8) WHILE AT THE POLLING PLACE, NO VOTER MAY BE COMPELLED TO
10 PRODUCE OR SUBMIT ANY IDENTIFICATION THAT IS NOT REQUIRED BY THIS
11 ARTICLE; AND

12 (9) A VOTER MAY CONFIRM OR ALTER THE VOTER'S VOTER
13 REGISTRATION RECORD THROUGH A SECURED INTERNET WEBSITE OR OTHER
14 ELECTRONIC MEDIUM MAINTAINED BY THE STATE BOARD.

15 3-102.

16 (a) Except as provided in subsection (b) of this section, an individual may
17 become registered to vote if the individual:

18 (1) Is a citizen of the United States;

19 (2) Is at least 18 years old or will be 18 years old on or before the day of
20 the next succeeding general or special election;

21 (3) Is a resident of the county as of the day the individual seeks to
22 register; and

23 (4) Registers pursuant to this title.

24 (b) An individual is not qualified to be a registered voter if the individual:

25 (1) Has been convicted of theft or other infamous crime, unless the
26 individual:

27 (i) Has been pardoned; or

28 (ii) [In connection with a first conviction, has] HAS completed the
29 sentence imposed for the conviction, including [probation] PROBATION, PAROLE,
30 COMMUNITY SERVICE, RESTITUTION, AND FINES;

31 (2) Is under guardianship for mental disability; or

32 (3) Has been convicted of buying or selling votes.

1 3-201.

2 (A) An individual may apply to become a registered voter:

3 (1) At a local board office or the State Board office;

4 (2) At a registration site administered by a local board;

5 (3) By mail;

6 (4) When applying to the Motor Vehicle Administration for the issuance,
7 renewal, or modification of a driver's license or identification card;

8 (5) When applying for services at a voter registration agency; or

9 (6) With the assistance of a volunteer authorized by the State or local
10 board.

11 (B) A VOTER MAY CONFIRM OR ALTER THE VOTER'S REGISTRATION
12 INFORMATION THROUGH A SECURED INTERNET WEBSITE OR OTHER ELECTRONIC
13 MEDIUM MAINTAINED BY THE STATE BOARD.

14 9-102.

15 (a) The State Board shall adopt regulations for the review, certification, and
16 decertification of voting systems.

17 (b) (1) The State Board shall periodically review certified voting systems
18 and evaluate alternative voting systems.

19 (2) THE STATE BOARD SHALL ENSURE THAT ANY VOTING SYSTEM IT
20 CERTIFIES PROVIDES EVERY VOTER IN THE STATE WITH THE OPPORTUNITY TO CAST
21 A BALLOT THAT IS ACCURATE AND THAT IS NOT COMPROMISED OR INFLUENCED BY
22 THE GEOGRAPHIC OR DEMOGRAPHIC QUALITIES OF THE COUNTY IN WHICH THE
23 VOTING SYSTEM IS USED.

24 (c) The State Board may not certify a voting system unless the State Board
25 determines that:

26 (1) The voting system will:

27 (i) Protect the secrecy of the ballot;

28 (ii) Protect the security of the voting process;

29 (iii) Count and record all votes accurately;

30 (iv) Accommodate any ballot used under this article; and

31 (v) Protect all other rights of voters and candidates;

1 (2) The voting system has been:

2 (i) Examined by an independent testing laboratory that is
3 approved by the National Association of State Election Directors; and

4 (ii) Shown by the testing laboratory to meet the performance and
5 test standards for electronic voting systems established by the Federal Election
6 Commission; and

7 (3) The public interest will be served by the certification of the voting
8 system.

9 (d) In determining whether a voting system meets the required standards, the
10 State Board shall consider:

11 (1) The commercial availability of the system and its replacement parts
12 and components;

13 (2) The availability of continuing service for the system;

14 (3) The cost of implementing the system;

15 (4) The efficiency of the system;

16 (5) The likelihood of breakdown;

17 (6) The system's ease of understanding for the voter;

18 (7) The convenience of voting afforded by the system;

19 (8) The timeliness of the tabulation and reporting of election returns;

20 (9) The potential for an alternative means of verifying the tabulation;

21 (10) Accessibility for disabled voters; and

22 (11) Any other factor that the State Board considers relevant.

23 (e) (1) The State Board shall adopt regulations relating to requirements for
24 each certified voting system, including a voting system deemed certified under
25 subsection (f) of this section, governing its operation and use.

26 (2) The regulations shall specify the procedures necessary to assure that
27 the standards of this title are maintained, including:

28 (i) A description of the voting system;

29 (ii) A public information program by the local board, at the time of
30 introduction of a new voting system, to be directed to all voters, candidates, campaign
31 groups, schools, and news media in the county;

- 1 (iii) Local election officials' responsibility for management of the
2 system;
- 3 (iv) The actions required to assure the security of the voting system;
- 4 (v) The supplies and equipment required;
- 5 (vi) The storage, delivery, and return of the supplies and equipment
6 necessary for the operation of the voting system;
- 7 (vii) Standards for training election officials in the operation and use
8 of the voting system;
- 9 (viii) Before each election and for all ballot styles to be used, testing
10 by the members of the local board to ensure the accuracy of tallying, tabulation, and
11 reporting of the vote, and observing of that testing by representatives of political
12 parties and of candidates who are not affiliated with political parties;
- 13 (ix) The number of voting stations or voting booths required in each
14 polling place, in relation to the number of registered voters assigned to the polling
15 place;
- 16 (x) The practices and procedures in each polling place appropriate
17 to the operation of the voting system;
- 18 (xi) Assuring ballot accountability in systems using a document
19 ballot;
- 20 (xii) The actions required to tabulate votes; and
- 21 (xiii) Postelection review and audit of the system's output.
- 22 (3) Certification of a voting system is not effective until the regulations
23 applicable to the voting system have been adopted.
- 24 (f) (1) Except as provided in paragraph (2) of this subsection, a voting
25 system authorized by law before July 1, 1978, including the use of paper ballots, shall
26 be deemed certified.
- 27 (2) On or after January 1, 2002, a voting system that uses mechanical
28 lever machines may not be deemed certified.

29 9-203.

30 (A) Each ballot shall:

- 31 (1) Be easily understandable by voters;
- 32 (2) Present all candidates and questions in a fair and nondiscriminatory
33 manner;

1 (3) Permit the voter to easily record a vote on questions and on the
2 voter's choices among candidates;

3 (4) Protect the secrecy of each voter's choices; and

4 (5) Facilitate the accurate tabulation of the choices of the voters.

5 (B) WHEN CASTING A BALLOT, THE VOTING SYSTEM SHALL PROVIDE THE
6 VOTER WITH NOTICE AND AN OPPORTUNITY TO CHANGE THE VOTER'S SPECIFIC
7 CHOICES BEFORE THE VOTER'S BALLOT IS FINALIZED AND CAST, IF:

8 (1) THE VOTER FAILS TO CAST A VOTE FOR ANY OFFICE OR QUESTION
9 FOR WHICH THE VOTER IS ELIGIBLE TO VOTE;

10 (2) THE VOTER CASTS A VOTE FOR A CANDIDATE OR QUESTION FOR
11 WHICH THE VOTER IS INELIGIBLE TO VOTE; OR

12 (3) THE VOTER CASTS A VOTE FOR MORE THAN THE ALLOWABLE
13 NUMBER OF CANDIDATES OR QUESTIONS FOR WHICH THE VOTER IS ELIGIBLE TO
14 VOTE.

15 9-214.

16 Each local board shall provide specimen ballots, so labeled, for all ballots to be
17 used in each election:

18 (1) For mailing to registered voters under Title 8 of this article[, if
19 mailing of specimen ballots is chosen or required in the county]; and

20 (2) For other informational purposes in accordance with the provisions of
21 this article.

22 9-304.

23 (a) [A] UPON REQUEST, A registered voter may vote by absentee ballot at
24 [an] ANY election [if the voter:

25 (1) Will be absent on election day from the county in which the voter is
26 registered;

27 (2) Because of accident, illness, or physical disability, will be unable to go
28 to the polling place on election day;

29 (3) Because of confinement in or restriction to an institution, will be
30 prevented from going to the polling place on election day;

31 (4) Because of a death or serious illness in the voter's immediate family,
32 will be unable to go to the polling place on election day;

1 (5) Is a full-time student at an institution of higher education located
2 outside the voter's precinct but within the county of registration, and academic
3 requirements prevent the voter from going to the polling place on election day; or

4 (6) Because of employment by or service as an official of the State Board
5 or a local board, is required to be absent from the precinct in which the voter is
6 registered to vote on election day].

7 (b) An individual may vote by absentee ballot if authorized under an
8 applicable federal law.

9 10-302.

10 (A) In a timely manner for each election, the local board shall provide for the
11 delivery to each polling place the supplies, records, and equipment necessary for the
12 conduct of the election.

13 (B) THE STATE BOARD SHALL ENSURE THAT, ON EACH ELECTION DAY, THE
14 ELECTION OFFICIALS AT EVERY POLLING PLACE HAVE ACCESS THROUGH THE
15 INTERNET OR BY OTHER ELECTRONIC MEDIUM TO A CENTRALIZED VOTER REGISTRY.
16 10-310.

17 (a) (1) In accordance with instructions provided by the local board, an
18 election judge shall qualify a voter by:

19 [(1)] (I) Locating the voter's name in the precinct register and locating
20 the preprinted voting authority card;

21 [(2) (i)] (II) 1. If the voter's name is not found on the precinct
22 register, searching the inactive list and if the name is found, qualifying the voter for
23 voting as instructed; or

24 [(ii)] 2. If the voter's name is not on the inactive list, contacting
25 the local board office and, if authorized, issuing a temporary certificate of
26 registration, as provided in § 3-601 of this article;

27 [(3)] (III) Establishing the identity of the voter by requesting the voter to
28 state the month and day of the voter's birth and comparing the response to the
29 information listed in the precinct register;

30 [(4)] (IV) Verifying the address of the voter's residence;

31 [(5)] (V) If any changes to the voting authority card are indicated by a
32 voter, making the appropriate changes in information on the card or other
33 appropriate form; and

34 [(6)] (VI) Having the voter sign the voting authority card and either
35 issuing the voter a ballot or sending the voter to a machine to vote.

1 (2) IN QUALIFYING A VOTER, AN ELECTION JUDGE MAY NOT REQUEST
2 OR REQUIRE A VOTER TO PRODUCE ANY IDENTIFICATION OR INFORMATION THAT IS
3 NOT AUTHORIZED UNDER THIS SECTION.

4 (b) On the completion of the procedures set forth in subsection (a) of this
5 section, a voter may vote in accordance with the procedures appropriate to the voting
6 system used in the polling place.

7 (c) (1) Before a voter enters a voting booth, at the request of the voter, an
8 election judge shall:

9 (i) Instruct the voter about the operation of the voting system; and

10 (ii) Allow the voter an opportunity to operate a model voting device,
11 if appropriate to the voting system in use.

12 (2) (i) 1. After a voter enters the voting booth, at the request of the
13 voter, two election judges representing different political parties shall instruct the
14 voter on the operation of the voting device.

15 2. An election judge may not suggest in any way how the
16 voter should vote for a particular ticket, candidate, or position on a question.

17 3. After instructing the voter, the election judges shall exit
18 the voting booth and allow the voter to vote privately.

19 (ii) A voter may take into the polling place any written or printed
20 material to assist the voter in marking or preparing the ballot.

21 (3) (i) Except as provided in subparagraph (ii) of this paragraph, a
22 voter who requires assistance in marking or preparing the ballot because of a physical
23 disability or an inability to read the English language may choose any individual to
24 assist the voter.

25 (ii) A voter may not choose the voter's employer or agent of that
26 employer or an officer or agent of the voter's union to assist the voter in marking the
27 ballot.

28 (4) If the voter requires the assistance of another in voting, but declines
29 to select an individual to assist, an election judge, in the presence of another election
30 judge that represents another political party, shall assist the voter in the manner
31 prescribed by the voter.

32 (5) An individual assisting a voter may not suggest in any way how the
33 voter should vote for a particular ticket, candidate, or position on a question.

34 (6) If a voter requires assistance under paragraphs (4) or (5) of this
35 subsection, the election judge shall record, on a form prescribed by the State Board,
36 the name of the voter who required assistance and the name of the individual
37 providing assistance to the voter.

1 (7) Except as provided in paragraphs (3) or (4) of this subsection, a
2 person over the age of 10 years may not accompany a voter into a voting booth.

3 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
4 October 1, 2001.
