SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A Senate Joint Resolution concerning

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Study Commission on Governmental Lobbying

3 FOR the purpose of creating a Study Commission on Governmental Lobbying;

4 providing for the appointment of the Commission; specifying the duties of the

5 Commission; requiring the Commission to issue a certain report by a certain

6 date; providing for the termination of the Commission; and generally relating to

7 the Study Commission on Governmental Lobbying.

8 WHEREAS, The Maryland Public Ethics Law was enacted in 1979 to assure the 9 people of this State that the operations of government are free from improper 10 influence and the appearance of improper influence; and

11 WHEREAS, The Ethics Law currently regulates persons who lobby on behalf of 12 private sector interests, but does not regulate the lobbying activities of persons

13 employed by State entities or local governments; and

14 WHEREAS, Since the enactment of the Ethics Law 22 years ago, lobbying by

15 governmental entities has grown, with a substantial increase in the number of

16 individuals whose major activity in the legislative session is an effort to influence the

17 legislative process; and

WHEREAS, In 1999, the General Assembly created a special study commission
to study lobbyist ethics, but did not authorize that commission to study the lobbying
activities of governmental lobbyists; and

21 WHEREAS, The people of Maryland have a right to be assured that

22 governmental lobbying is carried out in a way that enhances the public welfare and 23 does not subject our government to improper influence or create the appearance of 24 improper influence; now, therefore, be it

25 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That:

26 (a) There is a Study Commission on Governmental Lobbying.

27 (b) The Commission shall consist of the following 13 members:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 15

1 (1) Four individuals appointed by the President of the Senate, including 2 at least two members of the Senate of Maryland;

3 (2) Four individuals appointed by the Speaker of the House, including at 4 least two members of the House of Delegates;

5 (3) Five individuals appointed by the Governor, including at least one 6 representative of the State Ethics Commission.

7 (c) The chairman of the Commission shall be designated jointly by the8 President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House.

9 (d) The Department of Legislative Services shall provide staff for the 10 Commission.

11 (e) The Commission shall:

12 (1) Examine the Maryland Public Ethics Law as it relates to 13 governmental lobbying;

14 (2) Collect information about governmental lobbying practices and 15 standards of ethics for governmental lobbyists;

16 (3) Receive testimony, as the Commission considers appropriate;

17 (4) Propose any appropriate statutory changes to the Maryland Public18 Ethics Law as it relates to governmental lobbying; and

19(5)Report its findings to the Governor and, subject to § 2-1246 of the20State Government Article, to the General Assembly not later than December 31, 2001.

21 (f) The Commission shall terminate its existence after December 31, 2001; 22 and be it further
