## Education - Public Schools - Firearms Safety and Accident Prevention Education Program

This bill requires local boards of education to develop and implement a firearms or hunter safety program consistent with State guidelines for students in kindergarten through grade 12. The State Board of Education must establish policy and guidelines for the program. Local boards may implement the programs in conjunction with State or local law enforcement agencies, other entities of State or local governments, or community or civic organizations. The programs implemented by local boards may not involve the display or handling of ammunition or firearms on school premises. For students in grades 7 through 12, the programs may involve the display and handling of ammunition and firearms at established sport shooting ranges.

The bill is effective July 1, 2001.

## **Fiscal Summary**

**State Effect:** The Maryland State Department of Education could perform the additional administrative and oversight functions with existing resources.

**Local Effect:** Local school expenditures could increase by \$684,200 in FY 2002 for the cost of consulting fees and instructional materials. Future years would only reflect the cost of instructional materials. *This bill imposes a mandate on a unit of local government.* 

**Small Business Effect:** Potential minimal.

#### **Analysis**

**Current Law:** Firearms safety programs in public schools are not mandated.

**Background:** There are over 200 million guns in America, including at least one in about half of all U.S. households. A study sponsored by Handgun Control Inc., a Washington, DC-based organization that tracks gun control policies, found that there is a gun in about two out of every five households with children. The organization reports that the firearm death rate among teens 15-19 years old increased 222% from 1984 to 1994. In 1996 there were 109 firearm deaths of children and teenagers in Maryland. The number of such firearm deaths in other states include: 5 in Delaware, 16 in West Virginia, 32 in Massachusetts, 39 in Oregon, 56 in Minnesota, 67 in New Jersey, 68 in Washington, 110 in Virginia, and 182 in Pennsylvania.

**Local Expenditures:** One local school system in Maryland, Carroll County, has implemented a firearms safety curriculum in its public schools. After consulting with the Carroll County Public School System, the Maryland Association of Boards of Education advises that each local board would incur an average cost of \$5,000 for hiring a consultant to aid in the design of the program and an average cost of \$350 and \$500 for instructional materials at each public school. Assuming each local board of education develops and implements a firearms safety curriculum in all of its public schools in fiscal 2002, local school expenditures would increase by \$684,200. This estimate assumes that existing teachers or local law enforcement officers would lead the courses without additional compensation, and that local administration of the program could be handled with existing resources. Future year expenditures would only reflect the cost of instructional materials. **Exhibit 1** shows the estimated fiscal 2002 costs by school system.

**Small Business Effect:** If consultants are used to aid in the development of firearms safety and accident prevention programs, small consulting businesses could benefit.
