Department of Aging - Assisted Living Programs - Subsidies

This bill requires the Department of Aging (DOA) to provide monthly subsidies, when necessary and in accordance with available funds, to assisted living facility residents whose adjusted gross income is less than their cost of care. The monthly subsidy must meet the gap between income and cost of care up to \$650 per month.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: The bill would not substantively change State activities or operations.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: The Secretary of Aging is required to make maximum use of rent and other subsidies available and provide State funds to assist low-income elderly individuals to reside in assisted living programs as an alternative to more costly institutional care. Maximum levels of assistance and minimum numbers of low-income residents to be subsidized are not addressed.

Background: The DOA administers the Senior Assisted Living Group Home Subsidy Program which subsidizes assisted living facility costs for low-income elderly residents. In order to qualify for a subsidy, each applicant must undergo a physical assessment by the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DHMH).

The program's fiscal 2002 general fund budget allowance includes subsidy funds of \$3.2 million for 465 general subsidy (non-Medicaid) residents. Assuming that approximately 10% of the funds are used for local administrative costs, the current average monthly subsidy for 465 general subsidy residents is \$516.

Additional Information

Prior Introductions: This bill was introduced as SB 284 in the 2000 session, but received an unfavorable report by the Senate Finance Committee. A similar bill was introduced as SB 592 in the 1999 session and was also given an unfavorable report by the Senate Finance Committee.
