Maryland Day of Remembrance of the Armenian Genocide

This joint resolution designates April 24 as the Maryland Day of Remembrance of the Armenian Genocide.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: Designating a day for remembering the Armenian Genocide would not affect State finances.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: Maryland has not officially designated a day for remembering the Armenian Genocide.

Background: The Armenian Genocide was committed by the Ottoman Empire (present day Turkey) during 1915 through 1923. Approximately 1.5 million Armenians were killed which represented 60% of the Armenians living in the Ottoman Empire. Despite international recognition and condemnation of the Armenian Genocide, the modern Turkish state has officially denied acknowledgement of the genocide. International recognition of the Armenian Genocide has been made by most major nations including the United States, France, Russia, Israel, and the European Parliament. In 1990, President Bush called on all Americans to join with the Armenians on April 24 to

commemorate the victims of the Armenian Genocide. President Clinton issued a similar press release in 1994.

Five states have developed educational programs in public schools that focus on human rights abuses, including the Armenian Genocide. These states include California, Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Jersey, and New York. In California, legislation was enacted that required the department of education to produce films or videotapes on the Armenian Genocide and distribute them to local schools.
