# Workers' Compensation - Credit Against Payment of Permanent Partial Disability Awards After Appeal

This bill provides that, if an award of permanent partial disability under the State's workers' compensation laws is reversed or modified by a court on appeal, the payment of any new compensation awarded will be subject to a credit for compensation previously awarded and paid.

#### **Fiscal Summary**

**State Effect:** Potential minimal decrease in workers' compensation costs to the extent payments are reduced as a result of the bill.

**Local Effect:** Potential minimal decrease in workers' compensation costs to the extent payments are reduced as a result of the bill.

**Small Business Effect:** Potential minimal.

#### **Analysis**

**Current Law:** The Workers' Compensation Commission may order an offset or credit against an award for permanent partial disability benefits to a covered employee for: (1) temporary total disability benefits previously paid; or (2) vocational rehabilitation benefits previously provided. The commission may order reimbursement to an employer from an individual who knowingly obtains benefits to which the individual was not entitled.

**Background:** In *Philip Electronics North America v. Wright*, 348 Md. 209 (1997), the Court of Appeals held that an employer was entitled to a credit for the number of weeks of benefits actually paid, rejecting a "total monetary sum" theory in a permanent partial disability award.
