AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the State Board of Education shall report to the Senate Budget and Taxation Committee, Senate Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee, House Appropriations Committee, and House Ways and Means Committee on or before June 30, 2004, in accordance with § 2-1246 of the State Government Article, assessing the effectiveness of the Principal Training Pilot Program established under this Act. The report shall include information regarding:
18 19	(1) the jurisdictions in which principals who receive training under the pilot program are employed;
20 21	(2) the entities that receive funds for programs and the number of principals that each entity trains under each program;
24	(3) a comparison of Maryland School Performance Assessment Program scores within the participating counties for the year before the principals received training under the pilot program and for the first year after the principals completed the training:

31	SECTION 2. 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 2002. It shall remain effective for a period of 3 years and, at the end of June 30, 2005, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
