Mental Hygiene - Emergency Evaluation Petitions - Licensed Clinical Professional Counselors

This bill allows a licensed clinical professional counselor to petition for an emergency evaluation of an individual if the petitioner has reason to believe that the person has a mental disorder and that there is clear and imminent danger of the individual doing bodily harm to himself or another person.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: The change would not directly affect governmental finances.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: Under existing statute, the health professionals who may petition for an emergency evaluation of an individual with a suspected mental disorder are a physician, a psychologist, a clinical social worker, or a health officer or designee of a health officer who has examined the individual. The petition is given to a "peace officer" who must take the emergency evaluee to an emergency facility, where the evaluee must be examined by a physician within six hours to determine whether the evaluee meets the requirements for involuntary admission. The evaluee must be released after the examination unless the evaluee asks for voluntary admission or meets the requirements

for involuntary admission. An emergency evaluee cannot be kept at an emergency facility for more than 30 hours.

Background: There are 3,499 licensed clinical professional counselors in Maryland.
