**Criminal Procedure - Distribution of Noncontrolled Substance - Jurisdiction of
Trial Courts**

This bill provides concurrent jurisdiction for the circuit courts and the District Court of Maryland over the felony offense of distributing, attempting to distribute, or possessing with intent to distribute a faked controlled dangerous substance.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: The bill would not result in any significant foreseeable fiscal or operational impact to the courts.

Local Effect: None -- see above.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: With certain exceptions, the District Court does not have jurisdiction over a criminal case charging the commission of a felony.

A person may not distribute, attempt to distribute, or possess with intent to distribute a noncontrolled substance that the person represents as a controlled dangerous substance. A violator is guilty of a felony and, upon conviction, is subject to a maximum fine of \$15,000 and/or a maximum term of imprisonment of five years. A criminal case charging the commission of this crime is within the jurisdiction of the circuit court.

Additional Information

Prior Introductions: HB 176 of 2001 passed the House and the Senate with amendments. A motion to reconsider the third reading and special order were adopted by the Senate, but no further action was taken.
