House Bill 1009 Ways and Means (Delegates Finifter and Conroy)

Education - Certification Requirements for Teachers - Heimlich Maneuver and CPR Training

This bill prohibits the State Superintendent of Schools from issuing a teacher certificate to an individual who has not completed training in the Heimlich maneuver (HM) and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). Training for HM and CPR must be provided by an individual who has been approved by the Maryland State Department of Education. Individuals seeking teacher certification must provide the State Superintendent with documentation indicating that training has been completed. Local boards of education must reimburse teachers they employ for the cost of the training. A teacher who, in the course of employment, acts in good faith and without gross negligence to perform HM or CPR is immune from liability.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: The Maryland State Department of Education could maintain records of teachers certified in HM and CPR with existing resources.

Local Effect: Local school expenditures would increase by an estimated \$1.2 million in FY 2003 to reimburse teachers for HM and CPR training. Future year expenditures would reflect a relatively stable number of teachers being reimbursed. **This bill imposes a mandate on a unit of local government.**

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: Teachers are not required to be trained in HM and CPR. Local boards of education are required to carry comprehensive liability insurance to protect the board and its employees.

Local Expenditures: Local school systems estimate that approximately 8,700 new teachers will be employed for the 2002-2003 school year, and the Maryland State Department of Education estimates that 15,000 teachers renew their certificates annually. This results in 23,700 teachers who would be required to receive HM and CPR training in order to be issued teaching certificates in fiscal 2003. HM and CPR training courses range from approximately \$15 at local fire departments to \$85 at community colleges. Assuming an average cost of \$50 per teacher, local school expenditures would increase by \$1.2 million in fiscal 2003. Teachers are generally required to renew certification about every five years depending on the type of certificate held. Therefore, almost all teachers would be trained in HM and CPR by the 2007-2008 school year. If teachers must be retrained in HM and CPR at roughly the same interval that they must renew teacher certification, the costs would be relatively stable in future years.
