## A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

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### Polling Places - Access by Children Accompanying Parents

3 FOR the purpose of altering the maximum age at which a child may accompany a

- 4 parent in a voting room and voting booth at a polling place under certain
- 5 circumstances; and making stylistic changes.

6 BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments,

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OFMARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

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### Article - Election Law

14 10-308.

15 An election judge shall allow the following individuals to have access to the 16 voting room at a polling place:

17 (1) a voter;

18 (2) an individual who accompanies a voter in need of assistance in
19 accordance with § 10-310(c) of this subtitle;

20 (3) polling place staff;

- 21 (4) a member or other representative of the State Board or local board;
- 22 (5) an accredited watcher or challenger under § 10-311 of this subtitle;
- 23 (6) a child under the age of [11] 13 who accompanies a voter in

24 accordance with § 10-310(c) of this subtitle; and

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1 (7)any other individual authorized by the State Board or local board. 2 10-310. 3 Before a voter enters a voting booth, at the request of the voter, an (c) (1)4 election judge shall: 5 (i) instruct the voter about the operation of the voting system; and 6 (ii) allow the voter an opportunity to operate a model voting device, 7 if appropriate to the voting system in use. 8 (2)(i) 1. After a voter enters the voting booth, at the request of the 9 voter, two election judges representing different political parties shall instruct the 10 voter on the operation of the voting device. 11 2. An election judge may not suggest in any way how the 12 voter should vote for a particular ticket, candidate, or position on a question. 13 After instructing the voter, the election judges shall exit 3. 14 the voting booth and allow the voter to vote privately. 15 A voter may take into the polling place any written or printed (ii) 16 material to assist the voter in marking or preparing the ballot. 17 Except as provided in subparagraph (ii) of this paragraph, a (3)(i) 18 voter who requires assistance in marking or preparing the ballot because of a physical 19 disability or an inability to read the English language may choose any individual to 20 assist the voter. 21 A voter may not choose the voter's employer or agent of that (ii) 22 employer or an officer or agent of the voter's union to assist the voter in marking the 23 ballot. 24 If the voter requires the assistance of another in voting, but declines (4)25 to select an individual to assist, an election judge, in the presence of another election 26 judge that represents another political party, shall assist the voter in the manner 27 prescribed by the voter. 28 An individual assisting a voter may not suggest in any way how the (5) 29 voter should vote for a particular ticket, candidate, or position on a question. 30 If a voter requires assistance under [paragraphs] PARAGRAPH (4) or (6)31 (5) of this subsection, the election judge shall record, on a form prescribed by the State 32 Board, the name of the voter who required assistance and the name of the individual 33 providing assistance to the voter. 34 Except as provided in [paragraphs] PARAGRAPH (3) or (4) of this (7)35 subsection, a person over the age of [10] 12 years may not accompany a voter into a

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36 voting booth.

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
