A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

Polling Places - Access by Minors

3 FOR the purpose of removing the requirement that an individual who accompanies a

4 voter in a voting room and voting booth be a child of the voter; altering the

5 maximum age at which an individual may accompany an adult in a voting room

6 and voting booth at a polling place under certain circumstances; and making

7 stylistic changes.

8 BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments,

13 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF

- 14 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:
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Article - Election Law

16 10-308.

17 An election judge shall allow the following individuals to have access to the 18 voting room at a polling place:

19 (1) a voter;

20 (2) an individual who accompanies a voter in need of assistance in 21 accordance with § 10-310(c) of this subtitle;

22 (3) polling place staff;
23 (4) a member or other representative of the State Board or local board;
24 (5) an accredited watcher or challenger under § 10-311 of this subtitle;

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1 (6)[a child] AN INDIVIDUAL under the age of [11] 15 who accompanies 2 a voter in accordance with § 10-310(c) of this subtitle, PROVIDED THAT THE 3 INDIVIDUAL IS IN THE CARE OF THE VOTER AND DOES NOT DISRUPT OR INTERFERE 4 WITH NORMAL VOTING PROCEDURES; and 5 any other individual authorized by the State Board or local board. (7)6 10-310. 7 (c) (1)Before a voter enters a voting booth, at the request of the voter, an 8 election judge shall: 9 (i) instruct the voter about the operation of the voting system; and 10 (ii) allow the voter an opportunity to operate a model voting device, 11 if appropriate to the voting system in use. 12 (2)1. After a voter enters the voting booth, at the request of the (i) 13 voter, two election judges representing different political parties shall instruct the 14 voter on the operation of the voting device. An election judge may not suggest in any way how the 15 2. 16 voter should vote for a particular ticket, candidate, or position on a question. 17 After instructing the voter, the election judges shall exit 3. 18 the voting booth and allow the voter to vote privately. 19 A voter may take into the polling place any written or printed (ii) 20 material to assist the voter in marking or preparing the ballot. 21 Except as provided in subparagraph (ii) of this paragraph, a (3)(i) 22 voter who requires assistance in marking or preparing the ballot because of a physical 23 disability or an inability to read the English language may choose any individual to 24 assist the voter. 25 A voter may not choose the voter's employer or agent of that (ii) 26 employer or an officer or agent of the voter's union to assist the voter in marking the 27 ballot. 28 If the voter requires the assistance of another in voting, but declines (4) 29 to select an individual to assist, an election judge, in the presence of another election 30 judge that represents another political party, shall assist the voter in the manner 31 prescribed by the voter. 32 (5) An individual assisting a voter may not suggest in any way how the 33 voter should vote for a particular ticket, candidate, or position on a question.

34 (6) If a voter requires assistance under [paragraphs] PARAGRAPH (4) or 35 (5) of this subsection, the election judge shall record, on a form prescribed by the State

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Board, the name of the voter who required assistance and the name of the individual
 providing assistance to the voter.

3 (7) Except as provided in [paragraphs] PARAGRAPH (3) or (4) of this 4 subsection, [a person] AN INDIVIDUAL over the age of [10] 14 years may not 5 accompany a voter into a voting booth.

6 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 7 October 1, 2003.
