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- WHEREAS, The Early Head Start and Head Start programs, in addition to
- 2 Judy Centers, prekindergarten programs, child care centers, and child care providers
- 3 offer educational services to meet the needs of children and families; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Children and pregnant women participating in Early Head Start
- 5 and Head Start programs receive significantly more health care screening than

- WHEREAS, Low-income and at risk children who participate in early childhood
