4 FOR the purpose of urging the President of the United States, the U.S. Secretary of

5 State, the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee, and the entire U.S. Senate

6 to place a high priority on the ratification of the United Nations Convention on

7 the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women.

8 WHEREAS, The Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination 9 Against Women was adopted by the United Nations General Assembly on December 10 18, 1979, became an international treaty on September 3, 1981, and by June 2002, 11 170 nations including all of the industrialized world, except the United States, have

12 agreed to be bound by the Convention's provisions; and

WHEREAS, The United States supports and has a position of leadership in the
United Nations, was an active participant in the drafting of the Convention, and is a
signatory to the Convention; and

WHEREAS, The spirit of the Convention is rooted in the goals of the United
Nations and the United States, to affirm faith in fundamental human rights, in the
dignity and worth of the human person, and in the equal rights of men and women;
and

WHEREAS, The Convention provides a comprehensive framework for challenging the various forces that have created and sustained discrimination based on sex against half the world's population and the nations in support of the present Convention have agreed to follow Convention prescriptions; and

WHEREAS, Although women have made major gains in the struggle for equality in social, business, political, legal, education, and other fields in the past century, there is much yet to be accomplished and through its support, leadership, and prestige, the United States can help create a world where women are no longer discriminated against and have achieved one of the most fundamental of human rights, equality; now, therefore, be it
