## A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning
$2 \quad$ Vehicle Laws - Approaching Emergency Vehicles Parked on Highway -

FOR the purpose of requiring drivers approaching emergency and police vehicles stopped, standing, or parked on a highway and using certain visual signals, except when otherwise directed by a police officer, to vacate the lane closest to the emergency or police vehicle under certain circumstances and to slow to certain speeds under certain circumstances; and generally relating to requiring drivers to take certain actions when approaching certain emergency and police vehicles on a highway.

BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments, Article - Transportation Section 21-405
Annotated Code of Maryland
(2002 Replacement Volume)
SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
7 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

## Article - Transportation

9 21-405.
(a) On the immediate approach of an emergency vehicle using audible and visual signals that meet the requirements of § 22-218 of this article or of a police vehicle lawfully using an audible signal, the driver of every other vehicle, unless otherwise directed by a police officer, shall yield the right-of-way.
(b) On the immediate approach of an emergency vehicle using audible and 5 visual signals that meet the requirements of § 22-218 of this article or of a police 6 vehicle lawfully using an audible signal, the driver of every other vehicle, unless 27 otherwise directed by a police officer, shall drive immediately to a position parallel to 8 and as close as possible to the edge or curb of the roadway, clear of any intersection.

2 3 vehicle lawfully using an audible signal, the driver of every other vehicle, unless 4 otherwise directed by a police officer, shall stop and stay in this position until the 5 emergency vehicle has passed.

6 (d) A driver, when proceeding in the same direction as an emergency or police 7 vehicle, may not pass an emergency vehicle using audible and visual signals that 8 meet the requirements of § 22-218 of this article or a police vehicle lawfully using an 9 audible signal unless:
(c) On the immediate approach of an emergency vehicle using audible and visual signals that meet the requirements of § 22-218 of this article or of a police

LANES OF TRAFFIC MOVING IN THE DIRECTION THAT THE EMERGENCY OR POLICE
VEHICLE IS FACING, VACATE THE LANE CLOSEST TO THE EMERGENCY OR POLICE
VEHICLE; AND
(2) IF THE VEHICLE IS TRAVELING ON A HIGHWAY WITH ONLY ONE LANE OF TRAFFIC MOVING IN THE DIRECTION THAT THE EMERGENCY OR POLICE VEHICLE IS FACING:
(I) SLOW TO A SPEED THAT IS 20 MILES PER HOUR LESS THAN THE POSTED SPEED LIMIT WHERE THE POSTED SPEED LIMIT IS 25 MILES PER HOUR OR GREATER; AND duty to drive with due regard for the safety of all persons.
(F) EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE DIRECTED BY A POLICE OFFICER, WHEN AN EMERGENCY OR POLICE VEHICLE USING A VISUAL SIGNAL THAT MEETS THE REQUIREMENTS OF § 22-218 OF THIS ARTICLE IS STOPPED, STANDING, OR PARKED ON A HIGHWAY, THE DRIVER OF A VEHICLE APPROACHING THE EMERGENCY OR POLICE VEHICLE FROM THE REAR, AS SOON AS IT IS SAFE, SHALL:
(1) IF THE VEHICLE IS TRAVELING ON A HIGHWAY WITH TWO OR MORE
(II) TRAVEL AT 5 MILES PER HOUR WHEN THE POSTED SPEED LIMIT IS 20 MILES PER HOUR OR LESS.

SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 2003.
