- SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That Section 3 of this Act
- 11 shall take effect June 1, 2003. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and 7
- 12 months and, at the end of December 31, 2004, with no further action required by the
- 13 General Assembly, Section 3 of this Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and
- 14 effect.
