RESOLUTION NO.

1 A Senate Joint Resolution concerning

2 Medicare - Prescription Drug Benefit

- 3 FOR the purpose of requesting the United States House of Representatives and the
- 4 United States Senate to enact certain legislation providing for certain
- 5 prescription drug coverage as part of the federal Medicare program; and
- 6 generally relating to the prescription drug benefits under Medicare.
- WHEREAS, The use of prescription drugs improves the quality of care and
- 8 helps patients live healthier, longer, and more productive lives while keeping them
- 9 out of more costly acute care settings in the long term; and
- WHEREAS, The increased use of new and improved prescription drugs has
- 11 changed the delivery of health care in the United States since Medicare was enacted,
- 12 and while two-thirds of the Medicare population has some form of prescription drug
- 13 coverage, although at times inadequate, one-third of Medicare beneficiaries have no
- 14 coverage at all; and
- WHEREAS, Congress did not enact a drug benefit in the Medicare program,
- 16 the program is inadequate in providing the elderly and disabled with the most
- 17 appropriate drug therapies and preventing the delivery of quality health care at an
- 18 affordable cost; and
- 19 WHEREAS, The private sector provides affordable coverage by negotiating
- 20 discounts on drugs and meeting the needs of special populations with chronic diseases
- 21 and those with co-morbidities through coordinating care with disease management,
- 22 drug utilization review, and patient education programs, all of which aid in
- 23 ameliorating medical errors; and

- WHEREAS, Comprehensive reform of the Medicare program would utilize the
- 2 successful tools of the private sector to care for this population and use the
- 3 marketplace to foster competition among private plans, resulting in more choices of
- 4 quality coverage for seniors and the disabled while maintaining the financial
- 5 sustainability of the program; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Inaction by Congress has failed to provide for comprehensive
- 7 reform of Medicare, encouraging states to use their own resources to ease the burden
- 8 of their elderly and disabled populations and effectively assume an unfunded,
- 9 informal mandate; now, therefore, be it
- 10 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the
- 11 General Assembly requests that the United States House of Representatives and the
- 12 United States Senate enact financially sustainable, voluntary, universal, and
- 13 privately administered outpatient prescription drug coverage as part of the federal
- 14 Medicare program; and be it further
