FISCAL AND POLICY NOTE

Senate Bill 531 Budget and Taxation (Senator Ruben, et al.)

State Retirement and Pension System - Board of Trustees - Membership

This pension bill increases the membership of the Board of Trustees of the State Retirement and Pension System of Maryland (SRPS) from 14 to 15 members by adding a trustee who is a retiree of either the Teachers' Retirement System (TRS) or the Teachers' Pension System (TPS) at the time of the trustee's election.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: Special fund expenditures by the State Retirement Agency for trustee election costs would increase by \$100,000 every four years. It is assumed that the first year of such costs would be FY 2004. In addition, the agency would incur approximately \$10,000 in administrative costs annually due to the additional board member.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: Of the 14-member board, two trustees are members or retirees of the TRS or TPS, only one of whom may be a retiree at the time of election.

Background: Six members on the board are elected by active members, retirees, beneficiaries, and former vested members of the various systems. As indicated above, two are elected by teachers' systems participants. Two other board members are elected by State Police Retirement System participants; one of these board members must be a

retiree at the time of election. Finally, two other board members are elected by all the participants of the Employees' Retirement System (ERS), Employees' Pension System (EPS), the Correctional Officers' Retirement System (CORS), the Judges' Retirement System (JRS), the Legislative Pension Plan (LPP), the Local Fire and Police Retirement System (LFP), and the Law Enforcement Officers' Pension System (LEOPS). The distribution of elected board members and plan participants is illustrated in **Exhibit 1**.

State Expenditures: Board member elections require that a ballot be sent to every participant. The State Retirement Agency employs an outside vendor to administer board elections. Based on cost of existing teachers' system elections, the additional cost is estimated at approximately \$100,000, which covers printing, mailing, tabulating ballots, and postage. Assuming the first election were to take place in fiscal 2004, the next election would be in fiscal 2008. It is assumed that contractor costs would have increased 3% per year over that time.

In addition, the agency would incur approximately \$10,000 in additional expenses related to communications, expenses reimbursement, and travel to national pension conferences for the additional board member.
