Senate Joint Resolution 5(Senator Haines, et al.)Education, Health, and Environmental AffairsRules and Executive Nominations

Celebrate Freedom Week in Public Schools

This joint resolution urges local boards of education to develop and institute a Celebrate Freedom Week curriculum during the month of September for the purpose of instilling a sense of the sacrifices made during the founding of this country and the values upon which this country was founded.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: None.

Local Effect: Implementing a Celebrate Freedom Week in public schools would not materially affect local school expenditures.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Bill Summary: The Celebrate Freedom Week would include a recitation of an excerpt of the Declaration of Independence at the beginning of each school day by students in grades 3 through 12.

Local boards should provide for the exemption of students from the recitation of excerpts from the Declaration of Independence: (1) on written request from the student's parent or guardian; (2) on the basis of a conscientious objection to the recitation; or (3) by virtue of being the child of a representative of a foreign government to whom the U.S. government extends diplomatic immunity.

Current Law: Public schools are required to devote a part of the school day for appropriate observances on the following days: Washington's Birthday, Lincoln's Birthday, Veterans' Day, Columbus Day, Arbor Day, and any other day of national significance.

Background: The Maryland Social Studies Content Standards require that each student be given the opportunity to participate in the comprehensive social studies program. Several of the State requirements include:

- understanding the basic principles of American government expressed or implied in the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, court decisions, and laws;
- understanding the rights and responsibilities of individuals in the United States;
- appreciating the ideas expressed in the documents and symbols of human freedom;
- demonstrating respect and support for the rights and dignity of all individuals; and
- assuming citizenship responsibilities at the local, State, and national levels.
