Senate Bill 329 Finance (Senator Lawlah, et al.)

### **Oral Health Programs - Reducing Oral Cancer Mortality**

This bill requires the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DHMH) to develop and implement ongoing oral cancer educational programs to: (1) train health care providers to screen and properly refer patients with oral cancers; and (2) promote smoking cessation with a primary focus of meeting the needs of high-risk, underserved populations.

DHMH must submit a report on its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly by December 1 of each year. The existing Oral Health Advisory Committee appointed by the Secretary of DHMH must recommend to the Secretary the best methods to promote and implement a strategy to decrease oral cancer mortality and implement the bill's provisions.

## **Fiscal Summary**

## **Analysis**

**Current Law:** Chapter 307 of 2000 required DHMH to develop and implement oral cancer educational programs in Maryland. It also required DHMH to implement a Prevent Oral Cancer Pilot Program to screen, refer, and treat high-risk, underserved

adults for whom dental services are not ordinarily available. The pilot program is scheduled to terminate September 30, 2003.

**Background:** According to the National Institutes of Health, oral cancer accounts for about 8% of all malignant growths. Men, especially those older than 40, are affected twice as often as women. Approximately 50% of individuals who develop oral cancer live longer than five years. Nearly 75% of individuals diagnosed with oral cancer can be cured if the cancer is detected early before spreading to other tissues.

The DHMH fiscal 2004 budget allowance includes \$500,000 for oral cancer education programs in the State.
