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- 3 FOR the purpose of prohibiting a person, on or after a certain date, from
- 4 manufacturing, processing, or distributing a product or certain part of a product

- 14 Preamble
- WHEREAS, Chemicals known as brominated flame retardants (BFRs) are
- 16 widely used in the State. To meet stringent fire standards, manufacturers add BFRs
- 17 to a multitude of products, including plastic housing of electronics and computers,
- 18 circuit boards, and the foam and textiles used in furniture; and
- 19 WHEREAS, Polybrominated diphenyl ether (PBDE), which is a subcategory of
- 20 BFRs, has increased fortyfold in human breast milk since the 1970s; and
- 21 WHEREAS, PBDE has the potential to disrupt thyroid hormone balance and
- 22 contribute to a variety of developmental deficits, including low intelligence and
- 23 learning disabilities. PBDE may also have the potential to cause cancer; and
- 24 WHEREAS, Substantial efforts to eliminate BFRs from products have been
- 25 made throughout the world, including both the private and public sectors. These
- 26 efforts have made numerous alternatives available that are safe to human health
- 27 while meeting stringent fire standards. To meet market demand, it is in the interest
- 28 of Maryland manufacturers to eliminate the use of BFRs; and

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- WHEREAS, In order to protect the public health and environment, the General
- 2 Assembly believes it is necessary for the State to develop a precautionary approach
- 3 regarding the production, use, storage, and disposal of products containing BFRs;
- 4 now, therefore,
- 5 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
- 6 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

- 8 SUBTITLE 12. POLYBROMINATED DIPHENYL ETHER.
- 9 6-1201.
- 10 (A) IN THIS SUBTITLE THE FOLLOWING WORDS HAVE THE MEANINGS 11 INDICATED.
- 12 (B) "OCTABDE" MEANS OCTABROMINATED DIPHENYL ETHER.
- 13 (C) "PBDE" MEANS POLYBROMINATED DIPHENYL ETHER.
- 14 (D) "PENTABDE" MEANS PENTABROMINATED DIPHENYL ETHER.

- 16 (A) NOTWITHSTANDING SUBSECTION (B) OF THIS SECTION, ON OR AFTER
- 17 OCTOBER 1, 2008, A PERSON MAY NOT MANUFACTURE, PROCESS, OR DISTRIBUTE IN
- 18 THE STATE A PRODUCT OR A FLAME-RETARDANT PART OF A PRODUCT THAT
- 19 CONTAINS MORE THAN ONE-TENTH OF 1% OF PENTABDE OR OCTABDE BY MASS.
- 20 (B) THIS SECTION DOES NOT APPLY TO THE PROCESSING OF METALLIC
