A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Dealers - Precious Metal Objects - Transfer of Records**

3 FOR the purpose of requiring a dealer to submit certain records by one of two
4 methods, including by electronic computer entry, by a certain time each day, if
5 required by the law enforcement unit; and generally relating to the transfer of
6 records of dealers of precious metal objects.

12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
13 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

14 **Article - Business Regulation**

15 12-304.

16 (a) (1) A dealer shall submit a copy of each record to the primary law
17 enforcement unit in accordance with subsection (b) of this section.

18 (2) If the dealer transacts business in accordance with § 12-206(b) of this
19 title, the dealer also shall submit a copy of the records to the local law enforcement
20 unit in accordance with subsection (b) of this section.

21 (3) On the request of a dealer, the Secretary shall provide to the dealer a
22 list of local law enforcement units.

23 (b) The dealer shall submit the records by ONE OF THE FOLLOWING
24 METHODS, AS REQUIRED BY THE LAW ENFORCEMENT UNIT:

25 (1) BY delivering or mailing a copy of the records by the end of the next
26 business day after the day on which the item was acquired; OR

1 (2) BY ELECTRONIC COMPUTER ENTRY BY THE END OF EACH BUSINESS
2 DAY.

3 (c) Each copy of a record, submitted to the primary law enforcement unit and,
4 if applicable, local law enforcement unit, shall include:

5 (1) the license number of the dealer;

6 (2) the location of each item listed in the record; and

7 (3) the information required under § 12-302 of this subtitle.

8 (d) A copy of a record submitted under this section:

9 (1) shall be kept confidential;

10 (2) is not a public record; and

11 (3) is not subject to Title 10, Subtitle 6 of the State Government Article.

12 (e) A law enforcement unit may destroy the copy of a record submitted under
13 this section after 1 year from the date the law enforcement unit receives the copy.

14 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
15 October 1, 2004.
