Maryland Parole and Probation Hearings - Evidence - Preliminary Breath Tests

4 FOR the purpose of permitting the result of a preliminary breath test to be used as

- 6 or a parole revocation hearing; and generally relating to preliminary breath test
- 7 results.

18 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF

19 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

Article - Transportation

21 16-205.2.

22 (c) The results of the preliminary breath test shall be used as a guide for the

23 police officer in deciding whether an arrest should be made and may not be used as

24 evidence by the State in any court action. The results of the preliminary breath test

25 may be used as evidence by a defendant in a court action. The taking of or refusal to

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1 submit to a preliminary breath test is not admissible in evidence in any court action.

2 Any evidence pertaining to a preliminary breath test may not be used in a civil action.

3 (E) NOTWITHSTANDING THE PROVISIONS OF SUBSECTION (C) OF THIS
4 SECTION, THE RESULT OF A PRELIMINARY BREATH TEST MAY BE USED AS EVIDENCE
5 BY THE STATE OR A DEFENDANT IN:

6 (1) A VIOLATION OF PROBATION PROCEEDING CONDUCTED BY A COURT; 7 OR

8 (2) A PAROLE REVOCATION HEARING CONDUCTED BY THE PAROLE 9 COMMISSION.

10 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect

11 October 1, 2004.
