A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

Health Occupations - State Board of Examiners in Optometry - Scope of Practice FOR the purpose of prohibiting certain optometrists from managing open-angle glaucoma unless that optometrist obtains a certain certification; requiring

- 6 certain optometrists to attend a certain number of hours of continuing education
- 7 on a certain topic; requiring a certain number of hours of continuing education
- 8 to be counted toward the total number of required hours of continuing
- 9 education; requiring certain optometrists to complete a certain course;
- 10 exempting certain optometrists from certain requirements; authorizing certain
- 11 optometrists to administer or prescribe certain pharmaceutical agents;
- 12 repealing a requirement that certain optometrists make a certain referral to an
- 13 ophthalmologist; requiring certain optometrists to consult with an
- 14 ophthalmologist under certain circumstances; requiring certain optometrists to
- 15 provide certain tests or photos to a certain ophthalmologist under certain
- 16 circumstances; limiting certain prescriptions to certain dosages; requiring
- 17 certain optometrists to refer certain patients to an ophthalmologist or a certain
- 18 physician; authorizing certain optometrists to order certain laboratory tests;
- 19 requiring the State Board of Examiners in Optometry to approve certain
- 20 continuing education courses; requiring the Board to grant a waiver of certain
- 21 requirements under this Act to certain individuals until a certain date; requiring

2 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF3 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, on or before October 1,
2004, the State Board of Examiners in Optometry shall approve at least one
continuing education course for a therapeutically certified optometrist administered
by the Maryland Optometric Association in conjunction with the Maryland Eye

19 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the State Board of

20 Examiners in Optometry shall grant a waiver of the certification requirements of §

21 11-404.1 of the Health Occupations Article to any individual who is currently a

22 therapeutically certified optometrist until July 1, 2005.

23 SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the State Board of

24 Examiners in Optometry shall certify a licensed optometrist as a therapeutically

25 certified optometrist prior to the license renewal date if the optometrist completes the

26 requirements of § 11-404.1 of the Health Occupations Article, as enacted by this Act,

27 prior to the license renewal date.

28 SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 29 July 1, 2004.
