A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 University of Maryland Eastern Shore - School of Pharmacy

- 3 FOR the purpose of requiring the President of the University of Maryland Eastern
- 4 Shore to establish a School of Pharmacy at the University of Maryland Eastern
- 5 Shore; providing for the purpose of establishing a School of Pharmacy; and
- 6 generally relating to the establishment of a School of Pharmacy at the
- 7 University of Maryland Eastern Shore.

- 14 WHEREAS, The State of Maryland is currently facing a severe shortage of
- 15 licensed pharmacists; and
- WHEREAS, Maryland imports approximately 50% of its pharmacists from
- 17 outside the State; and
- 18 WHEREAS, The increased need for pharmacists has been created by the
- 19 increasing number of prescriptions being written and dispensed, the increased
- 20 direct-to-consumer advertising by pharmaceutical companies, the greatly expanded
- 21 insurance coverage for prescriptions by insurance companies and health care plans,
- 22 and the development of new medications at a faster rate than ever before; and
- 23 WHEREAS, An American Hospital Association special workforce survey found
- 24 rural hospitals to have the highest percentage of unfilled pharmacist positions; and
- 25 WHEREAS, Minority populations, including African Americans are not well
- 26 represented in the pharmacy profession;
- 27 WHEREAS, It is only by increasing the number of students enrolled in
- 28 pharmacy education that the workforce demand for pharmacists can be realized; and

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- 1 WHEREAS, Maryland's only current academic pharmacy program at the
- 2 University of Maryland School of Pharmacy, Baltimore expanded enrollment 15% in
- 3 the fall of 2000, almost exceeding the capacity of existing facilities and stretching
- 4 existing faculty to the limit; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Only five of 82 accredited pharmacy degree programs at colleges
- 6 and schools of pharmacy are located at historically black institutions and only 7.1% of
- 7 3,265 students receiving a Doctor of Pharmacy degree in the 1998-1999 academic
- 8 year were African Americans; and
- 9 WHEREAS, The Maryland Pharmacist Association on June 10, 2002 passed a
- 10 resolution at its annual convention to "support the establishment of an accredited
- 11 pharmacy school at any institution of higher learning in Maryland such as the
- 12 University of Maryland Eastern Shore."; and
- 13 WHEREAS, A School of Pharmacy at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore
- 14 will signify the State's commitment to provide equal educational opportunities by
- 15 adding to the number of historically black institutions with a School of Pharmacy,
- 16 increasing the number of minorities in the profession, and increasing the number of
- 17 practicing pharmacists knowledgeable about the needs of rural and seriously
- 18 underserved populations; and
- 19 WHEREAS, A School of Pharmacy at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore
- 20 will also greatly contribute to the rural health care and rural economic development
- 21 in the State; now, therefore,
- 22 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
- 23 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:
