Hospitals and Health Care Facilities - Maternity Patients - Shaken Baby Syndrome

This bill requires a hospital or health care facility that provides maternity and obstetrical services to provide written information about shaken baby syndrome to a maternity patient prior to the discharge of the patient's newborn or infant child from the hospital. Failure to do so may not be construed to create a private right of action.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: None. The bill pertains exclusively to private sector activities.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: Hospitals are required to provide a variety of educational information to patients such as: (1) a copy of the Patient's Bill of Rights; (2) information on mammograms; and (3) HIV testing information to pregnant women.

Background: Shaken baby syndrome is a severe form of head injury caused by violently shaking an infant or child that usually occurs in children younger than two years old. The violent shaking may result in permanent brain damage or death. Shaken baby syndrome is almost always caused by child abuse when an angry parent or caregiver shakes a baby to punish or quiet them. In rare instances, the injury may be caused accidentally by

tossing the baby in the air or jogging with a baby in a backpack. It does not result from gently bouncing or playing with a baby.
