House Bill 377

(Delegate Marriott, et al.)

Appropriations Budget and Taxation

Board of Public Works - Baltimore Zoo - Lease Payments

This bill requires any lease payment due by the State for the Baltimore Zoo to be included in the annual budget for the Board of Public Works. In addition, the bill states that it is the intent of the General Assembly that the name of the Baltimore Zoo be changed to the Maryland Zoo in Baltimore.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2004.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: None. The FY 2005 State budget allowance includes \$2.9 million to support the payment of the Baltimore Zoo lease. Altering the name of the Baltimore Zoo would not substantially impact zoo expenditures and would not affect State funding.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: Pursuant to a lease agreement, the Maryland Zoological Society receives an annual State payment to support general operations at the Baltimore Zoo. The actual State funding amount is not specified in the lease agreement.

Background: The Baltimore Zoo is operated by the Maryland Zoological Society, a nonprofit community-based corporation founded in 1967 as an outside fundraiser and

advisory group. The society's role expanded in 1984 when it formally assumed management responsibility for the Baltimore Zoo. The title to all facilities, real property, and animals remains with the City of Baltimore.

The Baltimore Zoo receives a significant amount of funding from the State, both for its lease payment and as an educational organization. Heretofore, these grants have been linked as a single line item in the State budget under funding for educational organizations. Budget pressures in fiscal 2003 resulted in a pro-rata reduction to all such educational organizations, each of which has its own line item in the budget. The zoo retained sufficient funding to cover its lease payment but expressed concern that its share of the reduction should have been applied to the education portion of the grant only. Budget reductions in fiscal 2004 held the lease portion of the grant for the zoo harmless. In calendar 2002, the State provided the Baltimore Zoo with \$3.7 million, which accounted for 31.3% of the zoo's unrestricted revenues as shown in **Exhibit 1**.

State Fiscal Effect: As part of the lease agreement, the State provides the Maryland Zoological Society with a \$2.9 million grant to support general operations at the Baltimore Zoo. The lease payment is now included as a separate line item in the annual budget for the Maryland State Department of Education. This bill does not alter the

amount of the annual lease payment and, therefore, would not affect State finances. **Exhibit 2** shows the level of State funding for the Baltimore Zoo since fiscal 2003.
