A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Workers' Compensation - Evaluation of Permanent Impairments**

3 FOR the purpose of requiring that a licensed psychologist or a qualified physician
4 perform an evaluation of only the mental or behavioral portion of a permanent
5 impairment in a workers' compensation case under certain circumstances;
6 requiring that the report of an evaluation in a case that involves a behavioral or
7 mental disorder be submitted to the Workers' Compensation Commission in
8 accordance with the regulations of the Commission; and generally relating to
9 the evaluation of a permanent impairment under workers' compensation law.

15 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
16 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

17 **Article - Labor and Employment**

18 9-721.

19 (a) [A] EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (C) OF THIS SECTION, A
20 physician shall evaluate a permanent impairment and report the evaluation to the
21 Commission in accordance with the regulations of the Commission.

22 (b) A medical evaluation of a permanent impairment shall include information
23 about:

- 24 (1) atrophy;
- 25 (2) pain;
- 26 (3) weakness; and

1 (4) loss of endurance, function, and range of motion.

2 (C) IF A PERMANENT IMPAIRMENT INVOLVES A BEHAVIORAL OR MENTAL
3 DISORDER, A LICENSED PSYCHOLOGIST OR QUALIFIED PHYSICIAN SHALL:

4 (1) PERFORM AN EVALUATION OF ONLY THE MENTAL OR BEHAVIORAL
5 PORTION OF THE PERMANENT IMPAIRMENT; AND

6 (2) REPORT THE EVALUATION TO THE COMMISSION IN ACCORDANCE
7 WITH THE REGULATIONS OF THE COMMISSION.

8 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
9 October 1, 2005.
