A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 International Trade Agreement - Procurement Rules - General Assembly 3 Approval

4 FOR the purpose of prohibiting State officials, including the Governor, from binding

- 5 the State or consenting to bind the State to the government procurement rules
- 6 of an international trade agreement except under certain circumstances;

7 authorizing the Governor to bind the State or to consent to bind the State to the

- 8 government procurement rules of an international trade agreement only if the
- 9 General Assembly enacts certain legislation; providing that certain consent that
- 10 a State official, including the Governor, has given for the State to be bound to
- 11 certain government procurement rules of any international trade agreements on
- 12 or before a certain date is declared invalid and that the State is not bound by the
- 13 government procurement rules of certain international trade agreements;
- 14 providing that a copy of this Act be forwarded to certain individuals; and
- 15 generally relating to the authorization needed to bind the State or to consent to
- 16 bind the State to certain government procurement rules of an international
- 17 trade agreement.

23 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF

24 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

2 3-308.

3 (A) EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (B) OF THIS SECTION, STATE 4 OFFICIALS, INCLUDING THE GOVERNOR, MAY NOT:

5 (1) BIND THE STATE TO THE GOVERNMENT PROCUREMENT RULES OF 6 AN INTERNATIONAL TRADE AGREEMENT; OR

Article - State Government

7 (2) GIVE CONSENT TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO BIND THE STATE
8 TO THE GOVERNMENT PROCUREMENT RULES OF AN INTERNATIONAL TRADE
9 AGREEMENT.

(B) THE GOVERNOR MAY BIND THE STATE OR GIVE CONSENT TO THE
FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO BIND THE STATE TO THE GOVERNMENT PROCUREMENT
RULES OF AN INTERNATIONAL TRADE AGREEMENT ONLY IF THE GENERAL
ASSEMBLY ENACTS LEGISLATION THAT EXPLICITLY AUTHORIZES THE GOVERNOR TO
BIND THE STATE OR GIVE CONSENT TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO BIND THE
STATE TO THE GOVERNMENT PROCUREMENT RULES OF A SPECIFIC INTERNATIONAL
TRADE AGREEMENT.

17 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That any consent that a State

18 official, including the Governor, has given for the State of Maryland to be bound by

19 the government procurement rules of any international trade agreement on or before

20 the effective date of this Act is declared invalid and the State of Maryland is not

21 bound by the government procurement rules of any international trade agreement for

22 which a State official, including the Governor, has given consent for the State of

23 Maryland to be bound to on or before the effective date of this Act.

24 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That a copy of this Act be

34 SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 35 October 1, 2005.
