19 20 21	(a) (1) A person may not make, or cause to be made, a statement, report, or complaint that the person knows to be false as a whole or in material part, to a law enforcement officer of the State, of a county, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of the State, or of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Police with intent to deceive and to cause an investigation or other action to be taken as a result of the statement, report, or complaint.
25 26 27 28	(2) DURING THE COURSE OF AN INVESTIGATION, A PERSON MAY NOT MAKE, OR CAUSE TO BE MADE, A STATEMENT, REPORT, OR COMPLAINT THAT THE PERSON KNOWS TO BE FALSE AS A WHOLE OR IN MATERIAL PART, TO A LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER OF THE STATE, OF A COUNTY, MUNICIPAL CORPORATION, OR OTHER POLITICAL SUBDIVISION OF THE STATE, OR OF THE MARYLAND-NATIONAL CAPITAL PARK AND PLANNING POLICE WITH THE INTENT TO DECEIVE.
